The final day of the joint teachers' institute of Union, Walla Walla and Baker counties was under way here today with the concluding programs to include talks by Miss Kate L. Hous, of the Eastern Oregon Normal school; E. D. Towler, of the high school; H. C. Seymour, state 4-H club leader; Mrs. L. L. Douglass, Alice Marguerite, L. N. Madsen, Mrs. Cornelia Marvin Pierce and Dr. C. E. Moore, of Cornell university.

The feature event of yesterday's institute was a banquet held at 6:30 o'clock in the La Grande hotel ballroom, presided over by E. A. Sayre, superintendent of schools of Union county. Approximately 200 attended. The Rev. V. E. Hall gave the invocation.

Dr. Moore speaks

The main talk of the evening was given by Dr. Moore on the subject, "Pedagogical Powder—Now and Then" in which he defended modern teachers as well as the earlier tutors. In his opening remarks Dr. Moore said, "A most ubiquitous and at the same time an undecided case before the bar of the American public is none other than the 'faculty case'." In his next remarks, he pointed out the fact that the coming and acceptance of beauty aids have not been universally approved, especially by certain particular people for particular groups—one group being none other than the American school teacher.

"The board of education in a well-known Pennsylvania city would drop the teacher whose tresses are shortened by tonsorial art," he stated. "Apparently her position is not suspended by a thread or measured by a hair's breadth, but determined by a puff of wind."

There has been no mere puff against the powder-puff, but persistent and telling blows, he pointed out. Dr. Moore spoke of the former day dress of the school teacher, pointing out that the men of those days wore silk stockings, bright shoes and knee buckles, not to mention the waist coat of yellow embossed silk and the shawls and skirts of it crinkled with rows of silver buttons. Furthermore there were ruffles on his cuffs. In those days the powder was not on the nose—it was a few inches

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4,702 PIECES
IN QUILT MADE
BY AID WOMEN

A beautiful quilt containing 4,702 pieces has been made by Division A of the Royal Sisters Aid of the Christian church, under the supervision of Mrs. C. W. Bonding.

Last spring Mrs. B. L. Putnam suggested that each member of the aid make a quilt block 15 inches square with 25 or more pieces, and the woman having the quilt block with the most pieces would receive the quilt. A cent a piece was paid by the owner of each block, thus raising a fund of \$35.18 for the church building fund. One lady, not understanding that each piece was to be paid for, made a block with 184 pieces, but declined to give a penny a piece, and made another block. However, her block has been put in the quilt, and is made of 854 tiny squares of material.

The next largest amount was Mrs. George Rochester, who sewed 284 pieces into the 15-inch square. After winning the quilt she presented it to Mrs. Putnam.

Another interesting quilt this organization is making is a friendship quilt of green and white with white stripes running across the quilt according to the present plan. This is another way of raising funds, charging twenty-five cents for two names.

The Oregon State college took eleven, regarded as one of the strongest first-year college teams in the Pacific Northwest, will play the Eastern Oregon Normal school eleven in La Grande on Friday afternoon, Oct. 18, at about 2:30 o'clock.

This was definitely decided yesterday afternoon when Coach Bob Quinn received a telegram from Corvallis, confirming the arrangements for the game.

This will be the second game of the season for the E. O. N. squad, and will follow a two-week rest after the victory over the College of Idaho Coyotes here a week ago.

In addition to the game with the Rooks, Coach Quinn announced this morning that a game with Columbia university of Portland had been practically arranged to be played in Pendleton on Armistice day. Both Columbia and E. O. N. are ready to play, the only thing standing in the way now is the arranging of details by the Pendleton American Legion, which is to sponsor the contest.

Other games on the E. O. N. schedule follow:

Oct. 26, at Lewiston, Idaho against Lewiston Normal school; Nov. 15 or Thanksgiving day, against the University of Idaho.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 11 (AP)—A favorable report was voted by the senate agriculture committee today on the nominations of all members of the federal farm board.

All except three of the nominations were approved unanimously.

One vote was cast against Chairman Legge and three votes were cast against Carl Williams, of Oklahoma, who represents cotton, and Sam R. McKelvie, of Nebraska, who represents wheat.

Of the 19 members on the committee all voted except Senators Norris, Republican, Nebraska, and Shipstead, Farmer Labor, Minnesota, who were not present during the hearings on confirmation.

Chairman McNary of the committee said he would make the report to the senate immediately and would open up the debate on confirmation the first of next week.

He declined to disclose the names of senators voting against any of the members.

NAMPA AND BLUE
ELEVENS BATTLEInterstate High School
Football Game Under

With today's game scheduled as the first major test of the season, Coach Ira Woodie gave his team a light workout last night, including a session at goal kicking. His squad started the game this afternoon in good physical condition.

The Nampa-La Grande game, according to reports from the athletic field, was opened before a large crowd.

Planting Of Fall Grain Is Almost
Completed Here—Umatilla Beginning

Although most of the grain growers in Union county have completed their planting for the coming year, and with some of the wheat fields up, conditions are more backward this fall in Umatilla county.

According to a news story published yesterday in Pendleton fall planting of wheat is now under way generally in all parts of Umatilla county, and with the rainfall of last Tuesday, more farmers are expected to start seeding.

In the past too early now to predict the effect that the moisture deficiency may have upon the 1930 crop of the county. Many farmers would not begin planting yet even though the rainfall for the year were normal, and there is yet time for sufficient rain to fall to overcome the present lack of moisture.

"There have been some rumors circulated that because of the lack of moisture, many growers would wait until spring to sow their wheat. These rumors conflict with statements from authoritative sources that fall seeding will be about normal."

Question Polly
On Appearance
Of 'Dead' BondsDeputy Prosecutors in
Portland Quiz Former
Engineer of American
Bank Building.

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 11 (AP)—Deputy prosecutors were prepared today to further question Howard Polly, former engineer of the American Bank building here, regarding the reappearance of \$14,000 worth of bonds supposedly destroyed with a \$1,000,000 issue of the Interstate Utilities company in a furnace at the bank building on June 24, 1925. Polly, who was arrested at Eugene, was brought to this city last night and expressed mystification at the reappearance of the bonds.

"I helped two men carry two boxes of bonds from the street elevator to the furnace," he told chief deputy District Attorney George Mowry, "and helped them throw the bonds into the furnace, but that was the last I saw of them. How some of them got back in circulation is a mystery to me."

Polly said there were others in the building when he left 20 minutes after the bonds were thrown into the furnace.

"My assistant was there until 9 o'clock that night and there were janitors and others who had access to the furnace room," he declared. He is held in default of a \$2,000 bond on a specific charge of "having a false instrument of debt in his possession with intent to utter it as true."

Polly said he was employed at the bank until Saturday, when he resigned to accept a better position at Eugene.

Mowry revealed that one of the bonds was returned here from Des Moines, Iowa, and 21 from San Francisco. He said he had information that 21 bonds, of \$1,000 and \$500 denominations, were raked from the furnace after officials of the Interstate Utilities company and the lumbermen's Trust company had left the furnace room, believing them destroyed.

The bonds were issued by the Utilities company, a Washington and Idaho corporation, and underwritten by the trust company, a local firm.

Mowry suggested that the bonds had been wrapped in thick layers and that only the outer layers were destroyed by the fire. The inner layers apparently having been saved.

He also said he had information that a second unidentified person conspired with him. A nationwide search is being made for this person by a private detective agency, he declared.

Mowry revealed that about \$250,000 worth of the issue had been sold and redeemed by the trust company before they were destroyed.

Exploding Still

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 11 (AP)—Lyle Lemon, 27, Portland, was in a house in a hospital today following the explosion of a still in Reverman's pretentious two-story dwelling last night.

Lemon was struck with steel fragments of the still and killed instantly, while Reverman suffered serious burns from boiling hot steam and being struck by flying portions of the still.

The home was destroyed partially from the explosion. The interior of the home was a wreck, police said, who intimated they would arrest Reverman if he recovered.

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 11 (AP)—Mystery surrounding the disappearance of two members of the Divine Order of the Royal Arm of the Great Elefen, for whom the police have been searching in the mountain areas of Los Angeles and Ventura counties, was partly cleared up today with the discovery in Ventura of the grave of Mrs. Harlene Saloriss, 35-year-old former Portland woman, and information that the body of Mrs. Frances May Turner had been buried in San Gabriel, a Los Angeles suburb, although the death certificate was filed in Ventura.

More Damaging
Testimony Aimed
At Theater ManFormer Employees Are Being
Depended Upon to
Back up Allegation of
"Coloring."

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 11 (AP)—Former employees of Alexander Pantages, multi-millionaire theater magnate, were being depended upon by the state today to corroborate its allegation that the vaudeville man, on trial in superior court on a statutory charge preferred by 17-year-old Eunice Pringle, ordered his associates to color their testimony in his favor.

William Jobbenan, former Pantages publicity man, who testified yesterday that Pantages "had suggested" that he shape his testimony to aid his employer, was to resume the stand for his cross-examination by defense counsel. He was to be followed by Tille Russo, unheretofore key witness, former assistant theater manager, and C. C. Harden, identified as having been employed in various capacities by Pantages.

Publicity Man Testifies

Questioned by District Attorney Burton Fitts, the publicity man testified that he was attracted by securities to the door of his office late afternoon of August 9. Directly opposite his office on the mezzanine floor of the Pantages building, he said, he saw the Pringle girl struggling with Pantages.

The day following the alleged attack, Jobbenan said he and Pantages had a conversation in the theater man's office, and that he asked Pantages what had happened on the day previous. Pantages, the witness said, told him that he was coming down to Jobbenan's office to attend to a business matter, the young dancer, who was attempting to book a shift on his circuit, following, and that when he found Jobbenan out, he took the girl into the little room across the way to discuss the booking.

Almost immediately, the witness said Pantages told him, the girl began to scream.

"Did he say anything about you having been in that little room before he and Eunice went in?" asked Fitts.

"Yes—he told me I had come from the room as he and Eunice asked him."

The latter quotation was subject to revision should Manager Joe McCarthy start Charley Root as his pitcher. With Root pitching the Athletics were only 6 to 5 choices.

SEATS OUTSIDE PARK

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 11 (AP)—Some 1200 persons will pay to see the A's and the Cubs play the third game of the world's series today but their investment will not be counted in the day's receipts at Shibe park.

These fans will be accommodated in temporary seats built atop buildings along Twentieth street, which faces the ball park.

Prices of tickets range from \$10 to \$25. The owner of one of the larger places spent \$500 to buy 1175 seats to conform with city building regulations. He expects to get \$11 a seat, the extra dollar to go for the government tax.

NAME PLANTS
THAT ARE TO
MAKE WHISKEY

WASHINGTON, Oct. 11 (AP)—Prohibition Commissioner Duran has announced the American Macmillan Spices company and the Frankfort Distilling company, of Louisville, and the Glenview Distilling company, of Glenview, Ill., had been selected by the government to manufacture whiskey.

The three, Duran said, are to make Bourbon whiskey, with the distilling to manufacture eye whiskey still to be announced.

The selections were made under the government's plan of booting out this year the distillation of approximately two million gallons of whiskey annually to replace the stocks in bond which have dropped to about \$500,000 gallons.

The program was outlined under the law requiring the prohibition bureau to keep in adequate supply of medicinal whiskey available.

THREE RUNS
ARE MADE IN
ONE INNINGBush Pitches Masterful

SHIBE PARK, Philadelphia, Oct. 11 (AP)—With Rogers Hornsby and Kiki Cuyler emerging from their famous batting slump to drive across all their runs, the Chicago Cubs staged a comeback to score their first world's series win today in the third game.

The final tally was 3 to 1, with Guy Bush getting the pitching decision over George Earnshaw, who started his second straight game and struck out ten men to increase the Cub strike total to 36 for the series.

The Athletics still led by two games to one. The fourth game will be played at Shibe park tomorrow.

Paid Attendance 29,921

The official paid attendance was announced as only 29,921. The smallest crowd that has been to a world series game in nine years. This was a sharp knockdown from club estimates of nearly 40,000 for there seemed few bare spaces in the stands. The receipts were \$140,915, more than \$75,000 below either game at Chicago.

The money was divided on a basis of \$76,404.10 to players, \$14,061.50 to advisory council and \$50,929.40 to the contending clubs and leagues.

SHIBE PARK, Philadelphia, Oct. 11 (AP)—Although the sun was shining, there were many empty seats at game time for the third world's series contest.

Nick Atrock and Al Schacht put on a burlesque fight in a ring by third base as the umpires conferred with the two captains, Eddie Collins and Charley Grimm, at the plate.

Bush and Earnshaw warmed up steadily as the preliminaries continued.
