above, on the powdered wig.
"But what of the pedagogical powder?" he questioned. "Was it or was it not in the sacred and hallowed colonial days? It was. Not on the shiny nose but on the shiny hair—a few inches above the nose—on the powdered wig. Is it then a matter of noses versus hair and the intervening three or four inches? It may be, and why not?"

Certainly the pedagogical of "then" was not content to get along with his own hair but generously added a wig and then powdered the thing besides. Dr. Moore pointed out, "Now, where is the vanity case? Wigs versus powdered hair. Powder on wigs, powder on cheeks. Silk stockings then, silk stockings now. Vanity? Possibly. But to you my good schoolmaster who tutored my forebears and to you who so ably teach my child, regardless of battle scars and powder marks, I can only express my gratitude. You have both promoted progress through lofty purpose and shall we say—pedagogical powders." In closing, Dr. Moore paid a high compliment to the Oregon teachers and also to Oregon's secretary.

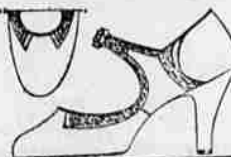

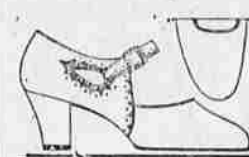
