charges as "false and ridiculous." "Dr. Goben's statements are merely an effort at reprisal because I fired him. Anybody can look at the books of the church. I have had them audited frequently, and I am too busy to pay any attention to Dr. Goben's charges."

Mrs. Minnie Kennedy, mother of the evangelist, who arrived in Los Angeles yesterday from Seattle, where she had been the defendant in a breach of promise suit, said that her visit would take no part in the fight.

"It is just a coincidence that I arrived here at the time Dr. Goben brought his charges against the church," said Mrs. Kennedy. "While I am willing to help my daughter in what little ways I can, I will take no part in the controversy. As soon as I have finished my work here I will return to the north and continue my own church work."

Pantages Enter Case

Alexander Pantages, retired theater magnate now on trial for an alleged attack on Eunice Pringle, 17-year-old dancer, Mrs. Lola Pantages, his wife, recently convicted of manslaughter in connection with the death of a Japanese gardener after a motor accident; Pantages' two sons and the Pantages' attorneys were drawn into the temple charges by Dr. Goben, who informed the district attorney's office that a conference attended by Mrs. McPherson took place at the Pantages home within an hour after the theater man's wife was found guilty.

Superior Judge Carlos S. Hardy, who presided over the trial of Mrs. Pantages, and who recently was tried on charges of having accepted a \$2000 love offering from Mrs. McPherson by the California state senate, before which body impeachment proceedings against him failed, issued a statement in which he said he had not been aware of any conference and did not see how it could affect him in any way. It was not alleged by Dr. Goben that Judge Hardy had attended the meeting.

Three Judges For Hearing

Three judges for the presiding judge of the Los Angeles superior court to designate two judges to sit with him at Mrs. Pantages' probation hearing on Oct. 25. "The case has assumed such public importance," Judge Hardy said, "that in order to render a decision which will be fair both to the state and the defendant the opinions of three judges should decide the issue."

Judge Hardy did not indicate that this move on his part had any connection with Dr. Goben's charges.
