Scoring an emphatic hit, the new Pathé picture, "Show Folks," a back-stage love romance, will show at the Colonial Sunday. The production, directed by Paul L. Robert Armstrong is excellent in the portrayal of a manager; Miss Barriscale, who returns to the screen after years of retirement, and Miss Lombard as the baby-doll vamp, are fully up to standard. The direction is all that could be asked for.
