Band of Ghouls Being Sought By Oregon Officers

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 14 (AP)—A band of Ghouls, which already have robbed a grave of one body and several Indian graves of beaded relics and ancient weapons, leaving human bones strewn about burial grounds, were being sought throughout Oregon today after Multnomah and Umatilla county authorities revealed specific instances of destruction yesterday.

The fact that Ghoulish activities on Indian burial grounds in Umatilla county had been conducted about the same time Mrs. Mitchell's body was removed puzzled authorities. Major Omar Buehler, superintendent of the Umatilla reservation, said he found at least four graves of Indian warriors opened, bones scattered about, and weapons and other articles buried with tribal Indians missing.

The grave of Tulepot, a Chinle Indian, who died a score of years ago and that of Charles Whitfield, an Indian medicine man, who died in 1907 had been opened and plundered, major Buehler said.

Authorities in both counties believe the destruction is the work of an organized band.
