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Idaho Vandals Will Leave For Oregon Tonight

MOSCOW, Idaho, Oct. 17 (AP)—The Idaho Vandals planned one more practice session this afternoon before they entrain for Portland where on Saturday they expect to settle the first phase of the question of football supremacy in the Northwest this season.

CARDINALS READY FOR ORANGE TEAM

Stanford to Start Regulars, in Anticipation of Hard Game.

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal., Oct. 17 (AP)—With the Cardinal football rolling smoothly and gaining crushing power with every day's practice, Oregon State, one of the big threats of the north was expected to meet its match on the gridiron here Saturday.

Announcement of the Cardinal line-up today, almost simultaneous with the announcement of the Oregon State line-up, revealed that neither aggregation would find victory an easy matter to attain.

The notable feature of both line-ups was the preponderance of regulars on each side, many of them veterans of football classics of another year.

With the exception of Preston left end, and Helser at right guard, the Cardinals named regulars throughout their line-up.

The Oregon invaders were scheduled to arrive at Pleasanton, across the bay tonight, and had a workout on the Stanford stadium scheduled for Friday.

The Cardinal line-up included: Neil, Muller ends; Artman, Tandy tackles; Deibel, Dawson guards; Heinicke, center; Fleishacker, Krentler, Idaho, and Smullin backs.

OREGON TO MEET IDAHO SATURDAY

Coast Conference Football Will Make Its 1929 Bow in Portland.

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 17 (AP)—Pacific coast conference football will make its 1929 bow in Portland Saturday when the universities of Idaho and Oregon meet on Multnomah stadium field, and on the outcome will hinge the championship of the northwest.

The lineup of the Vandals' offensive is Waldemar Pedersen, the "Galloping Swede" who does most of the ball-carrying from quarterback position. But Pedersen is not the only ball toter on the squad.

There are four other quarterbacks capable of stepping in when necessary. Kenneth Barrett, a veteran from last year, Herbert Owens, Clinton Huff and John Norman are all drilled to take up the burden when Pedersen leaves off.

Big Bill Kereshnik, whose line plunging and defense play made a hit with Portland fans two years ago when Idaho played Oregon State at the stadium, has changed roles somewhat but is still one of the important cogs in the Vandals' machine.

His plays halfback and his interference work has been a big factor in Idaho's previous victories.

Oregon Almost Unchanged As for the Oregon team it is almost the same as the one that routed the University of Washington here last year, only a few changes having been made because of graduation.

It seems that one of the most difficult problems of football organization is deterring the use of the unorthodox "screen pass" and its variations. The rules have been made more stringent and clarified on this feature of the aerial game for the 1929 season but it is understood that the rule-makers were obliged to call in a half dozen of the leading coaches and appeal for cooperation in removing the illegal screen plays.

In effect, the coaches summoned, all famous, replied: "We will be glad to cooperate, scrupulously avoiding any endeavor to circumvent the screen pass rule, if officials will be eagle-eyed in preventing the other fellows from getting away with it. We will play the game the way you want it, providing we have the proper protection."

The important thing, however, is that the rule-makers, headed by Edward K. Hall, have sought and gained the aid of the men who would be the game and the players. The new tumble rule, put in to minimize the "breaks," was drafted largely on the recommendation of the coaches. If they also will cooperate in eliminating "screen pass" complications, the job of gridiron officials will be made considerably easier.

Golf form is still about as difficult to figure as anything in sport. Johnny Goodman of Nebraska trailed Bobby Jones by something like 24 strokes in the U. S. open but he beat the great Georgian in the first round of the U. S. amateur two months later.

At Anneton, in the Canadian women's tournament, Helen Hicks conquered Glenn Collett in the final round but at Detroit, a few days later in the American championship, Miss Hicks lost to Maureen Orrutt, who then fell before eth superior play of Miss Collett. The only answer to this jangle of results seems to be that Maureen has as much of an Indian sign on Helen as Glenn has upon Maureen.

Last season around 12,000 spectators saw the Navy and Notre Dame play their October engagement at Soldier field. Probably no more than half that number will occupy the Baltimore stadium for their next battle on October 12, but the display of football should be considerably more than that of 1929.

Neither the Hoosiers nor Midwestern were going anywhere when they met last year. Each had been beaten at the outset and somewhat demoralized. Notre Dame's one-touchdown victory was far from impressive. Both teams gathered headway later on, particularly the Navy, and both are among the strongest outfits this season.

The sailors have the advantage of an earlier swing into action, also of facing the Hoosiers in home territory, but the prospect is for a close and exciting affair.

Georgia's early defeat by Oglethorpe takes some of the edge off the big game with Yale at Athens, October 12, but detracts nothing from its glamor. One of the first invasion of this southern stronghold will be one of the high spots of the season. In spite of early season developments, it also may turn out to be one of the best of inter-sectional engagements, for the Dixie Bulldogs will have all the inspiration of a Georgia homecoming and dedication of a new stadium to inspire a real battle with his northern rival.
