The Colorado Climber of Commerce says that Mrs. Holmes of Lawrence, Kan., was the first woman to hike up Pikes peak. She did it in 1850.

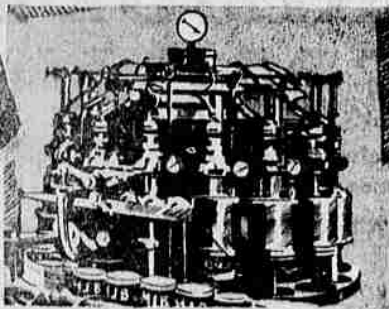

Chicago Doctor Asks that
All Five-Year-Olds Be
Given the Truth

NEW YORK, Oct. 16 (AP)—
And now, with December in the
offing and the reindeer all fed
and ready to go, along comes
Dr. William S. Sadler of
Chicago sternly decreeing that all
the five-year-olds in America be
told the devastating truth about
Santa Claus.

It would be better, says the doctor—who is by vocation a surgeon and by avocation a writer about mental complexes and phobias—had the children know the distressing fact from the start.

"However," he said today with a smile, "I could hardly expect to have public opinion with me on that point."

"Well, if there must be the Santa Claus business, let it be conducted with discretion. Let the child be disillusioned before he leaves the nursery. And, above all, let him hear the truth from his own parents and no one else."

It's of son's own sensibility the doctor is thinking and in a purely altruistic fashion.

An Awful Shock
If sonny hears the truth from the other kids, he's going to realize that his parents are well, not always quite truthful. And it's going to be an awful shock. Just think back, yourself.

And there that impression will remain, says the doctor, in that mental stomach crammed with all sorts of undigestible stuff which is called "the subconscious mind."

The anti-Santa Claus propaganda is set forth in a book which Dr. Sadler has just published and on which he elaborated conversationally today. The book he describes as "an anti-neurotic serum."

Dr. Sadler bases his theory on the amount of mischief and impressions given an infant can raise in its self-conscious mind as it grows up.

"Did you know, for instance," he asked, "that the first week of a baby's life can determine whether he's going to be a quitter or a go-getter?"

"We are all born with a yellow streak. That's our primitive nature. And we're all born lazy—with an unconscious but firmly implanted desire to get things without working for them and to leave away from things we don't like."

First Sensation
"The first sensation a newborn baby experiences is one of discomfort. He's cold. He's wet. He's hungry. He's out of a warm blanket. About that time in his little subconscious mind is born the idea:

"So that's the way you get what you want in this strange world. Just open your mouth and make a noise. Well, it's not very comfortable here, and I don't like it much, but I guess I've found the secret of getting by."

"And if they don't quit giving him what he wants whenever he yowls, he's going to grow up with the idea that all he's got to do to get by is to let out a yelp, and that no unpleasant sensation is ever to be endured if he can get out of it. He'll be a quitter."

"Blame Her Parents"
"Suppose the baby is a girl. Well, if she has a fine nervous breakdown after she grows up, don't blame her, but her parents. She got the idea in her subconscious mind right there in the cradle."

"It's in all of us," the doctor said, "the desire to get what we want by some magic. But the world is not that way."

"Some of us grow up, still clinging to our belief in magic, and become dreamers, drifters, loafers, sometimes criminals. Therefore, the sooner we learn to face reality, the better for us."

"My own son never believed in Santa Claus. When he was at the Santa Claus age, I bought him a little red suit and had him come right in and help me trim the Christmas tree. He was Santa Claus Jr."

"And he had a whole of a good time at it, too."

SALEM—A 170 pound bear was looted in the Mill City district by Henry Lambert.

Penciled Note Thought Written By Ocean Flier

KINKAWLAGE, Donegal, Irish Free State, Oct. 17 (AP)—A penciled note reading "going down in mid-Atlantic engine trouble" found off the Donegal coast in a rusty tin yesterday is believed here to be that of Lieutenant Commander H. C. MacDonald, who was lost in an unsuccessful attempt to fly from Harbor Grace to London just a year ago.

The note has been sent to Mrs. MacDonald for possible identification.

British officers at Port Lennan and civic guards who have seen the note declared they were satisfied as to its authenticity.

Lieutenant Commander MacDonald left Harbor Grace in a tiny Moth plane October 17, 1928. He was last seen about 100 miles out at sea after his take-off, apparently all well.

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Army And Navy Conference May Patch Up Break

WEST POINT, N. Y., Oct. 17 (AP)—Taking the initiative with a definite proposal for renewal of football relations between the Army and Navy, Major-General William H. Smith, superintendent of the United States military academy, today telegraphed Rear-Admiral S. S. Robinson, superintendent of the United States naval academy proposing an early conference in Washington aimed at reconciliation.

As a basis for ending the break which resulted originally from differences over eligibility standards, Major-General Smith proposed "that any member of either academy body who is declared eligible by his academy authorities, will be eligible to play."

PITTSBURGH, Oct. 17 (AP)—The Pittsburgh Sun-Telegraph in a copyrighted story today said Secretary of War Good forecast that football relations between the naval and military academy of Annapolis and West Point will be resumed this year.

TEST CASE IS NECESSARY TO FIX LIABILITY

WASHINGTON, Oct. 17 (AP)—Attorney General Mitchell said today a determination of the liability to arrest of the purchaser of bootleg liquor could be obtained only through the arrest and conviction for actual purchase and then the carrying of the case to the supreme court.

He expressed belief that no pending case would provide a proper test and that since the recently discussed Philadelphia case, in which the circuit court of appeals held the buyer not liable, was based upon conspiracy to violate the law through buying, it did not constitute a thorough test.

Carrying the case through the various courts to the highest tribunal, he pointed out, would take many months.

Mitchell refused to express an opinion on the question. He said he had turned the request of Senator Sheppard, democrat, Texas, for an inquiry to determine the purchaser's liability, over to the prohibition division for investigation.

Headless Body Of Woman Discovered
