## Revival Meeting Under Way Now In Church Here

The revival meetings which began last Sunday morning at the M. E. church, South, have been well attended at every service since then. It is reported. Even on Monday night, usually called the "blue night" in revivals, was marked by an unusual attendance. No call has as yet been made for conversions or for church membership, as this has been a time of "seed sowing," the minister says.

The Rev. Frank Hopkins, formerly evangelist and now pastor here, is doing the preaching. He declared that there are at least 7000 people in La Grande who make no religious pretensions at all, and probably 6000 of these never attend any religious services. There are about 2000 who are lined up with the various religious organizations and churches of the city, including Catholic, Protestant and all others, he said.

"If the Bible is true at all, even if it is but half true, evolution is a serious thing, and the present generation is headed toward hell at break-neck speed," he declared. "Some of the Christians of this city are desperately in earnest, but the great majority are taking it easy. They little realize that they shall be called to account at the judgment for what they either did or did not do to bring the unsaved to Jesus Christ."

These revival meetings will continue indefinitely, meeting each evening at 7:30 o'clock.

Sunday school will begin Sunday at 9:45 and the young people's meeting will be at 6:30. The Rev. Mr. Carlson of the Gospel Mission has attended some of the meetings and expressed great interest. The minister's son, Albert Hopkins, is leading the singing, which is one of the main features of each evening.

### Baptist Church

At the Baptist church Sunday morning the subject of the sermon will be "Gethsemane—Was Christ's Prayer in the Garden Answered?" The subject for the evening sermon will be "Calvary." 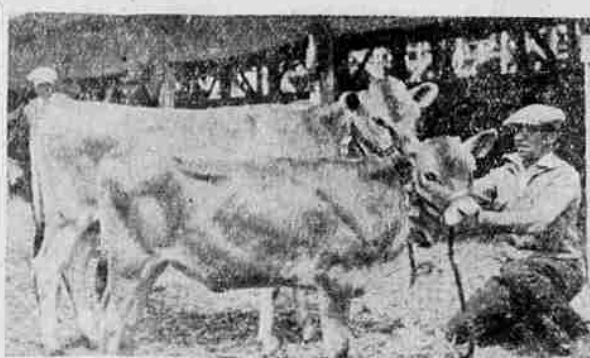
The revival meetings at the M. E. church South are being well attended, according to reports.

## OCTOBER'S REPORT REVEALS CROPS AT VERY NEAR NORMAL

The October crop report issued by the extension service of the Oregon State college, co-operating with the United States department of agricultural economics, shows the production of Oregon oats to be exactly equal to the estimate of one month ago.

Spring wheat average yield is three bushels more per acre and barley yield is four bushels more per acre than was estimated a month ago by the Oregon Federal-State Co-operative Crop Reporting Service according to the October first report of the same agency.

Potatoes, on the other hand, are very much below earlier indications, due almost entirely to continuous dry weather during critical stages in development of the crop. The current estimate of yield is only 87 bushels per acre for the entire state.

Corn and apples show slight decreases from a month ago, but all other crops, including all farm hay, are turning out better than earlier estimates indicated.

### Crops Are Average

Oregon corn production is now estimated at 2,327,000 bushels, compared to 2,072,000 bushels estimated last month. The average yield of spring wheat is reported at 21 bushels per acre, compared to 19.9 bushels estimated a month ago. The total spring wheat production is placed at 3,569,000 bushels, compared to 3,230,000 bushels last year and the average of

crop of 1,236,000 barrels, or approximately 3,795,000 bushels.

### Pears Exceed Estimates

Oregon pear production exceeded earlier estimates and is placed at 2,277,000 bushels, compared to 2,200,000 bushels a year ago and the five-year average of 1,661,000 bushels.

Peach production is also exceeding slightly the early estimates. In Oregon 232,000 bushels of peaches have been produced this year, compared to 252,000 bushels last year and the five-year average of 291,000 bushels.

This year's production of grapes is considerably above average and is placed at 2991 tons. The production last year was 2028 tons, and the average of the last five years is 1965 tons.
