H. M. BLACKMER FINED \$60,000 BY HIGH COURT

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18 (AP)—Justice Sillons of the District of Columbia supreme court today signed a formal order assessing fines totaling \$60,000 against Harry M. Blackmer, former president of the Midwest Oil company.

Counsel for Blackmer asked an appeal from the decision. Blackmer now in France, failed to appear when called as a government witness in the naval oil reserve cases, and \$100,000 in bonds he held in this country were seized under a special statute.

Standardization Sought in Schools

Flour Price Is Reduced Today; Eggs Advancing

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 18 (AP)—In keeping with the tumbling wheat market, the Sperry Flour company has reduced the price of all flours 2c. This puts the product on a basis of 77.5c a barrel, representing all fold, a decline of about 31 since the beginning of harvest.

With eggs advancing one cent at San Francisco and declining one cent at New York, Portland prices were firm, but unchanged.

The butter supply in liberal, but appears more than sufficient to supply the local trade.

The tone on hops appears to be weak and unsettled.

Following the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland News Service of the United States bureau of economics says:

"Trading was fairly active on the wholesale fruit and vegetable market this morning.

"Potato movement was especially good, both in carlots, and in small lots to retailers. Potato prices are unchanged however.

"Interest in pears has declined, and the few present offerings of fine quality boxes, D'Anjou and Comice are meeting with very slow demand.

"Receipts of cauliflower are heavy, eastern demand is poor, and the local market weak, at 55 to 80c per crate."

Farm Loan Total Paid Out So Far Nearly \$700,000

(Associated Press Feature Service) WASHINGTON (AP)—Applications for loans from the federal farm loan fund totaled approximately \$700,000 36-penny 20, Charles and Thomas receive in a statement to the senate committee on agriculture.

"In some of these cases, such as applications for loans in farm land, we have advised the applicants that we did not feel they were within the scope of our activities and have paid—3 those in the federal farm loan fund."

"In many cases the discussion developed the fact that the committee had not had an idea of the limitations on a considerable percentage of cases, or in the case of plant facilities that they had not been approved in some cases."

Closing Tone In Exchange is Heavy

NEW YORK, Oct. 18 (AP)—Further unsettlement developed in today's stock market as a result of the uneasiness created by the sharp rise in brokers' loans last week to within \$3,000,000 of the high record. Extreme declines in many of the active issues ranged from 1 to 16 points but recoveries, running as high as four points, took place in some issues in the early afternoon as a result of short covering. Trading showed a tendency to turn dull on the rally and speed up on the decline.

Several high priced stocks made substantial gains during the last hour, Western Union advancing 3 points, National Lead 2, Columbian Carbon 4, and General Electric 2. Adams Express extended its rise to 5 1/2. U. S. Steel, however, met fresh selling after it had crossed 215, and Murray corporation dropped to new low at 45. The closing tone was heavy. Total sales approximated 2,200,000 shares.

Wheat Prices In Chicago Move Up

CHICAGO, Oct. 18 (AP) Helped by unexpected higher quotations at Liverpool and by continued adverse crop reports from Argentina, wheat prices here advanced higher today. Argentine dispatches said general rains were needed badly, and that the wheat crop situation was becoming critical. Opening 1/2 to 1/4c higher, Chicago wheat afterward held near the initial range. Corn and oats were also firmer, with corn starting 3/4 to 5/8c up, but subsequently reacting. Provisions held steady.

WOOL REPORT
