Pendleton Co. Buys Salt Lake Mills

SALT LAKE CITY, Oct. 19 (AP)—Purchase by the Western Milling company of Pendleton, Ore., of the Salt Lake flour mills here at an approximate price of \$150,000 was announced today by the industrial department of the Salt Lake chamber of commerce.

It was said the new owners will operate the mill on a full time basis, and the present daily capacity of 600 barrels of flour will be increased to 1000 barrels. The present storage capacity of 125,000 bushels of wheat is to be doubled.

TIDE SWEEPS HIGHWAY

MCCLELLS, Wash., Oct. 19 (AP)—A heavy tide swept over the county highway here yesterday, flooding 10 houses. Sand and driftwood were carried over the road, which is a quarter of a mile from the ocean beach. Food Prices For September Higher

WASHINGTON, Oct. 19 (AP)—Retail food prices for the month ending September 15, the bureau of labor statistics announced today, showed an increase of one-third of one per cent over the previous month and of 2 per cent over the corresponding period last year.

At the same time the wholesale price index exhibited a recession of one-fifth of 1 per cent under August and 2 1/2 per cent below September, 1928.

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 19 (AP)—W. H. Lynch, head of the United States bureau of roads here, said today the bureau was ready to advertise for grading contract bids on the Siuslaw highway, after he had been advised the right of way had been secured by the Lane county court.

About \$600,000 has been set aside of the construction of the highway. Articles of agreement of cooperation have been signed by the state highway commission, the bureau of roads and Lane county court.

SUE PORTLAND PAPER

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 19 (AP)—A suit for \$50,000 personal and \$25,000 punitive damages was filed in circuit court today against the Portland Telegram by Alice Bornstad, ex-governess for Mildred Knott, minor. The complaint charges that embarrassment and physical injury were suffered by the girl through publication of letters written her by Walter Finke, 17, imprisoned for shooting to death a school companion.

MAKES AN APOLOGY

BRUSSELS, Oct. 19 (AP)—Foreign Minister Hymans today apologized to Ambassador Durazzo of Italy in behalf of the Belgian government for an anti-fascist riot in front of the Italian embassy last night.

No arrests had been made today but the police expected to round up suspected anti-fascists.

STREET CAR DAMAGED

NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 19 (AP)—A heavy charge of explosive went off early this morning under a Tulane Avenue street car, damaging the car's under carriage, smashing its windows and tearing up three feet of rail. The nine passengers and the crew escaped injury. The blast was laid to the trolley strike.

Jackals Really Wild Dogs

Jackals are any of several wild dogs in the Old World, especially Canis aureus of southeastern Europe, southern Asia and northern Africa. They are smaller, usually more yellowish and much more cowardly than wolves, and hunt in packs at night. Jackals feed on carrion and small animals including poultry. They can be tamed and by some are believed to be the progenitors of domestic dogs.
