TREND UPWARD IN AUTO DEATHS

Accident Toll Expected to Set New High Mark This Year

PORTLAND, Oct. 19.—Vigorous prosecution of the habitual reckless driver, with steps to entirely eliminate this criminal minority from the streets and highways, offers the only means of curbing the mounting toll of fatalities from motor vehicle accidents.

This is the conclusion drawn in a report received by the Oregon State Motor association of a nation-wide survey of the traffic accident situation. There is every indication, according to the survey, which was made by the American Automobile association, that the total number of motor vehicle accident fatalities in 1929 will exceed 27,000, thereby establishing a new high mark.

Oregon has an interim committee of the legislature working on this problem, but has passed no remedial legislation as yet. Ten states have solved the problem by adopting the A. A. A. safety responsibility law. These ten states are: California, New York, New Jersey, Rhode Island, Connecticut, Iowa, Maine, North Dakota, Wisconsin and Vermont. Briefly the plan, advocated by the A. A. A., calls for a strict driver's license law; revocation of the permits of those found guilty of serious violations of the motor vehicle laws, with the suspension of permit remaining in force until the guilty party has established proof of financial responsibility against possible future injury to persons or property. In addition, a person against whom a judgment has been rendered will be denied the use of the highways until it is liquidated and financial responsibility established as a future guarantee.

Trend Turns Upward
The trend of fatalities from motor vehicle accidents in ratio to car registrations, said the A. A. A. report, "was decidedly downward from 1917 to 1925, but since that time has steadily turned upward. There is every indication that a high mark for the past decade will be reached this year, despite the fact that the 1929 automobile is better equipped for safety than any car in the history of the industry.

"Moreover, this upward trend comes at a time when the percentage of increase in motor vehicle registrations is equal to the lowest on record. In addition, there has been more attention given to traffic control within the past five years than at any time in history. The problem has occupied the major attention of state and municipal authorities. Police forces have been augmented with additional men; state highway patrol units have been established; traffic lights have been placed by the thousands; legislators have advanced law after law, yet the gigantic toll of deaths from motor vehicle accidents continues to increase.

"The subject of safety is one of the dominant problems confronting the American people. Loss of a single life in a hurricane attracts wide attention, while an annual toll equivalent to the population of a progressive city is wiped out annually, with hardly more than passing interest."
