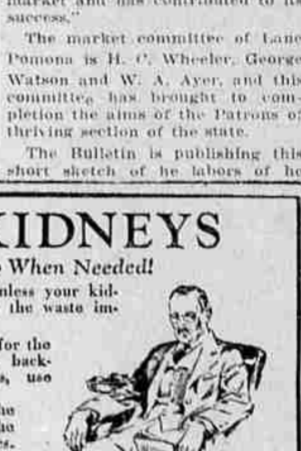

The new market is 144 feet by 154 feet, and has places for 95 stalls and four stores, has complete heating and ventilating systems, comfort rooms, lunch rooms, and every other convenience found in modern buildings. The building was financed by a bond issue of \$50,000, and sound financial plans have been made to retire these in 15 years, leaving the market free and sole owners of its property.

W. A. Ayres, who has been master of Eugene's public market for 15 years, publicly stated last August that "I attribute the success of the market to the loyal support of the farmers of Lane county and the cooperation of the business men of Eugene from the earliest beginnings of the public market in Eugene and contributing without hesitancy to the present time. 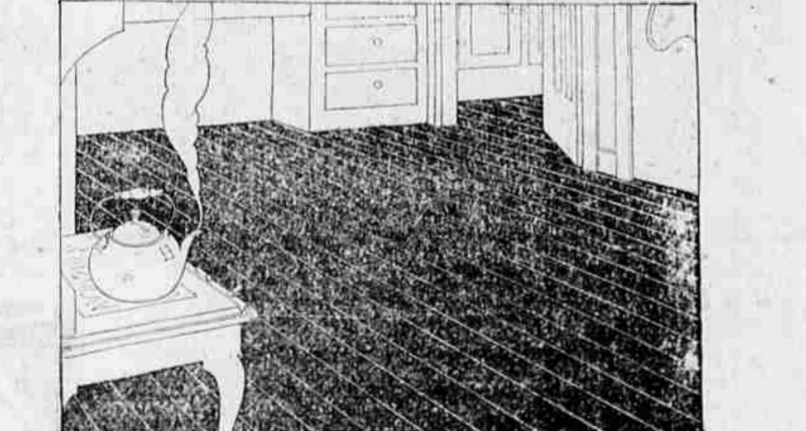
