PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 22 (AP) —With the exception of fresh pullets, which advanced from 30 to 32 to retailers and from 28 to 30 to wholesalers, the price of eggs remained firm and unchanged today.

Trading at the East Side market of the Gardeners' and Ranchers' association was moderate with the bulk of the sales in such seasonal products as cauliflower, celery, lettuce, apples, grapes, potatoes, carrots, spinach, onions, cabbage and the like. Prices for the most part vary little from day to day.

Over the Valley

Greatest Array Ever Held Of 4-H Projects

The greatest array of 4-H club livestock exhibits in the history of the west is assured for the Pacific International Livestock exposition in Portland October 26 to November 2, announces H. C. Seymour, of Corvallis, state club leader in the extension service, and manager of this division of the exposition.

Livestock entries are already 50 per cent greater than ever before, and Oregon boys and girls alone will show 350 animals in competition with those sent by other jurisdictions in Washington, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, Utah and British Columbia. Forty county champion livestock judging teams, half of them honors, and for the first time there will be a crops judging contest as well, in which Oregon will have at least five teams.

Two state champion demonstration teams from Oregon will put on their "show" at the International. One consists of Reid Smith and Fred Ward of Tillamook, who will demonstrate dairy herd management, and the other is made up of Lois Baller and Marie Osborne of Lane county who will demonstrate the use of flour sack material by bleaching the goods, dyeing it, making a child's dress and putting it on the youngster, all in 30 minutes.

In Comeback On Day After Dive

NEW YORK, Oct. 22 (AP) —The stock market staged one of its characteristically violent comebacks today after more than a week of severe declines, which culminated in yesterday's avalanche of selling. Scores of shares rallied about \$2 to \$30. The pace of trading slackened on considerably, however, and the ticker, which ran about one hundred minutes after the close yesterday, was able to keep fairly well abreast of the transactions on the floor of the exchange.

170 pounds. Rampont weighs 160, Davis 190 and Moe 175. Little's weight could not be learned. Ward, the midget of the bunch, is 150. Other backfield replacements were: Bowman, 165; Dowler, 175; and Canova, 165. The starting lineup for the Rocks last Friday weighed exactly 45 pounds less than one ton, exactly that Little weighs 170 pounds!
