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Sport Slants

Two of the biggest and most surprising individual declines in baseball this season involved the work of Leon (Gus) Gulin, the American league batting king of 1928, and Henry Louis Gehrig, the league's most valuable player in 1927 and the slinger picked to carry on the long range bombardment where Babe Ruth left off.

Gehrig, after giving Ruth a great chase for home run honors in 1927, was understood to have signed a new three year contract with the Yankees calling for \$20,000 in 1928, \$25,000 in 1929 and \$30,000 in 1930. He looked to be well worth the price but it will take a big come-back next year to offset this season's slump and earn another dividend.

It seems only a question of time before tennis follows the lead of golf and conducts open championships, where the best player in the game may be determined, regardless of how he makes his living.

Heretofore the tennis pro has been largely in the background, merely an instructor, while the amateur talent monopolized the competitive spotlight. There was not enough evidence a few years ago to broom an argument over the amateur champion's superiority but the development of such professional stars as Karel Kozeluh, the Czechoslovakian wizard, such Americans as Vincent Richards and Howard Kinsey has altered the situation. The "playing pro" is now a part of the game.

Kozeluh, the world's professional champion, has a mastery of technique and shot-making that even a Cochet or Lacoste at his best now would find difficult to overcome. Richards is better now than when he left amateur ranks and he won in the world's "first five" three years ago. The tennis produced in the Kozeluh-Richards final at Forest Hills in the national professional tournament appeared superior to anything shown by the amateur field that yielded to the veteran Tilden a few weeks before.

An open tennis championship, however radical it seems to the Old Guard of Newport, Germantown and Forest Hills, might solve a lot of the problems that have beset amateur tennis and end a lot of the hypocrisy that has grown up in recent years.

EGGS 150,000 YEARS OLD - HAMILTON, Bermuda (AP) - Dr. Carey L. Wood, of McGill University, estimates that fossilized eggs now deposited in the Bermuda Museum of Natural History, were laid between 150,000 and 2,000,000 years ago. TROJANS WINDING UP PREPARATIONS

Southern California Squad in Final Scrimmage Session Today.

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 22 (AP)—Coach Howard Jones grimly planned to put his University of Southern California squad through their final scrimmage session here today, preparatory to their departure tomorrow for Palo Alto where they meet Stanford next Saturday in one of the most significant games of the Pacific coast conference. The workout will contain a strenuous three-day period of training the Trojans have been getting. While the men of Troy have been working for more than a week behind closed gates in anticipation of the conflict with Coach Glenn "Pop" Warner's Cardinals, those familiar with the Trojan mentor's thoroughness say that he has left nothing unturned in the way of rounding up a defense against Stanford play.

Work Against Carl Plays - Today's scrimmage, it was understood, would deal almost entirely with efforts by the varsity to stop Spartan players, using the choice of Coach Warner's of offensive tactics.

A short drill on their own attack was expected to close the training period. Those who have followed the Trojans closely this season are of the opinion that Coach Jones has a lot of unused plays to spring on the Cardinals, including lots of passes. Strongly, officially or otherwise, there has been little mention of a proposed array of end sweeping plays. This may mean that Coach Jones is convinced that it would be useless to turn the Stanford wingman back, but it is hardly probable that something in the way of end runs will not be tried, with such speedsters as Jesse Hill, Marshall Duffell, and Gus Saunders in the backfield.

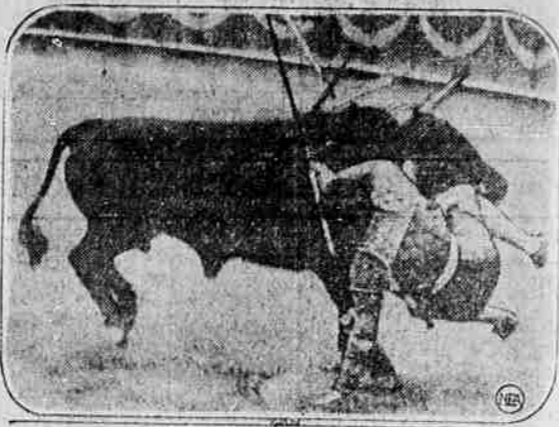

The Husky reserve strength has been weak this year and an effort is being made to bolster up the first string starters. Several substitutes, including Chuck Rosenham, Bob Buzzard, Jerry Logan, Neil Shuffman and Clarence Bredner, all backfield men, were given lots of work in scrimmage yesterday.

Walter Sahls, regular end, injured his right knee in the Washington-Washington State game last week and will be out for the rest of the season.

Champion Given Bloody Nose By Amateur Matman

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 22 (AP)—"Lynx" Gus Sonnenberg, nursing a split lip and a bruised nose, secured in an unscheduled street encounter, will risk his heavy-weight wrestling title in a bout here tonight with Ed "Strangler" Lewis, former champion.

Sonnenberg was injured, mentally and physically when he unexpectedly was called upon yesterday to defend himself from one of the blind articles which occupy a prominent place in his own wrestling repertoire. His physical hurt, consisting chiefly of a profusely bleeding nose, he announced would not interfere with his title bout tonight.

The mental injury was announced somewhat by a battery warning against Pete Ludlow, ball bond broker and amateur wrestler, issued from the office of city Prosecutor Floyd S. Dix, on Dix' complaint.

Sonnenberg charged Ludlow with hitting him with his head without warning, terminating a discussion of the possibilities of a bout between the amateur and the champion.

Lewis, in preparation for his attempt to regain the crown, has been training with the University of Southern California football team in an effort to develop a defense against the flying tackle which lost him the championship to Sam Allberg.

Sonnenberg is a former Dartmouth football player.

PISTINA WINS MATCH - SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 23 (AP)—Main Pictoria, the bad Coach, threw Frank Zumbo, so-called terrible Turk, in two straight falls at large indoor stadium here last night. Pictoria took the first fall using a crotch hold, first extracting himself from a series of head locks. He took the second in 12 minutes, using a flying mare.
