ing. This question each housewife must answer for herself. — The temperature of the fat is of utmost importance since this really solves the fat-soaking problem. If a thermometer is not used the bread crumb tests is reliable. An inch cube of bread from the soft part of the loaf should brown in 60 seconds when dropped into the hot fat. When a thermometer is used it should register 375 degrees Fahrenheit when the dough is dropped in and kept at 350 degrees during frying. Rings and twists should fry in three to four minutes. Balls need a little longer time.

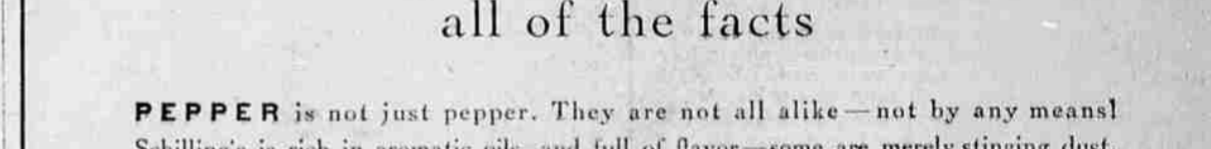
