WALLOWA GRAIN SPROUTS SLOWLY

Fields, Although Moistened by Recent Rains, Are Drying Rapidly

WALLOWA, Ore., (Special)—Beautiful autumn weather continues to prevail over this section of the country. There has been no rainfall during the past two weeks and with drying winds blowing part of the time the moisture has been rapidly taken from the surface of the soil. The latest rains appeared to have come deep enough into the soil to cause the greater part of the fall seeded wheat to commence sprouting; however, with the nights becoming much cooler and heavy frosts nearly every night the grain is making a very slow growth. But few of the early sown fields are showing up much green yet and farmers are of the opinion that a start before winter is as good a one as the grain will get. The experience of the majority of the farmers of this community in former years seems to be that the early sown grain which gets a good start before freezing weather has a much better chance of coming through and making good stands the following spring. The most of the seeding has been finished more than two weeks ago, however, a little late seeding is being done mostly on land which has been in crop this year and has been worked into condition for seeding after being pastured off. Some plowing is being done in parts of the valley section but even here the ground is very dry and the soil is too hard for good plowing except where plenty of irrigation water is available to irrigate the land good previous to plowing. C. A. Hunter recently irrigated a considerable acreage of his land in the valley east of town and has been very successful in plowing the past week; he says here the ground is plowing in good shape. Change conditions in the hill areas have shown a little improvement recently, since the last rains the new grain has started some and the stock are eating of the dry feed better since it has been softened some by rain. The most of the livestock has been gathered from the summer ranges at this time and placed in the pastures and fields. Nearly all of them show the effects of the long continued dry spell and many are not going to be in extra good condition to start into the winter. Milk production from the milk cows in the dairy cows in this community has been cut to a considerable extent by the shortage of good green feed at this season of the year. Some of the herds which do not have good pastures are being fed hay in order to keep them milking good. J. W. Bright, who lives a few miles east of town has been busy recently putting up a third crop of alfalfa hay from a small tract on the farm they own. The first and second cuttings from this piece of land were exceptionally heavy and the third cutting has been fairly heavy. Some small lots of hay are yet to be made in this community recently, with the prices ranging from \$12 to \$15 per ton for the best classes of hay. Four water wells are drilled at the corners of a square 200 or 300 feet on a side. In the center is drilled one oil well. Water is forced down the four corner wells under pressure, and oil comes up the central well.
The method works, says Dr. Charles R. Petrie, professor of geology and meteorology at Carnegie Institute of Technology, regardless of oil wells that may be in the vicinity. The method is called the "five-spot."
Dr. Petrie has just completed four years study of the method and says it has "brought up production tremendously."
