At Pringleport, Ore., a valuable dog was caught in a trap, and had chewed part of his leg in an effort to free himself, before he was found and released by Mr. Fleetwood said.

Submarine Tonnage Again Seen As Obstacle In Naval Parley

By Kirke Simpson (AP Feature Service Writer) WASHINGTON (AP)—Seven-year-old statements of naval policy made by France, Italy and Japan also indicated the position of dilemma ahead for the five-power naval reduction conference.

The European continental powers and Japan made their formal pronouncements at the Washington conference of 1921-22. They are of textual record in connection with refusal of the other four countries, including the United States, even to consider British proposals to abolish submarine warfare.

The French answer was to announce a naval building program of 322,000 tons of cruisers and 99,000 tons of submarines.

"The French delegation has been instructed by resolution of the Paris cabinet and the French supreme council of national defense, to consent to no concession in respect to the above figures," said the statement read to the conference December 25, 1921, by M. Sarraut.

Quoting the immediate reply of Arthur Balfour, head of the British delegation, the record continues: "It is perfectly clear that if at Britain's very gates a fleet of 99,000 tons of submarines (60,000 tons to be of the newest type) was to be constructed, no limitation of any kind on auxiliary vessels capable of dealing with submarines could be admitted by the government he represented. He had no doubt, if the occasion ever arose, that Great Britain would be equal to it."

The original American proposal was 99,000 tons of submarines each

for Great Britain and the United States, 54,000 tons for Japan in the 5-3 ratio, and Italian and French tonnage at a 1.75 ratio to the American and British 5.

In a desperate eleventh hour attempt to save the conference as far as auxiliary vessels went, Secretary Hughes offered to cut the American and British tonnage to 60,000 each. Balfour accepted. Japan insisted she must have 54,000 tons even in that event.

Senator Schramer for Italy viewed the French program with "serious concern" but stuck to his guns on Franco-Italian parity, already granted as to capital ships.

That ended the discussion except for a resolution proposed by Mr. Hughes and adopted that "no ship of war other than a capital ship or aircraft carrier hereafter built shall exceed a total tonnage displacement of 10,000 tons and no ship shall be carried by any such ship with a tonnage in excess of 8,000."

That was the birth of the 8-inch gun cruiser, which has since proved the stumbling block to supplies.

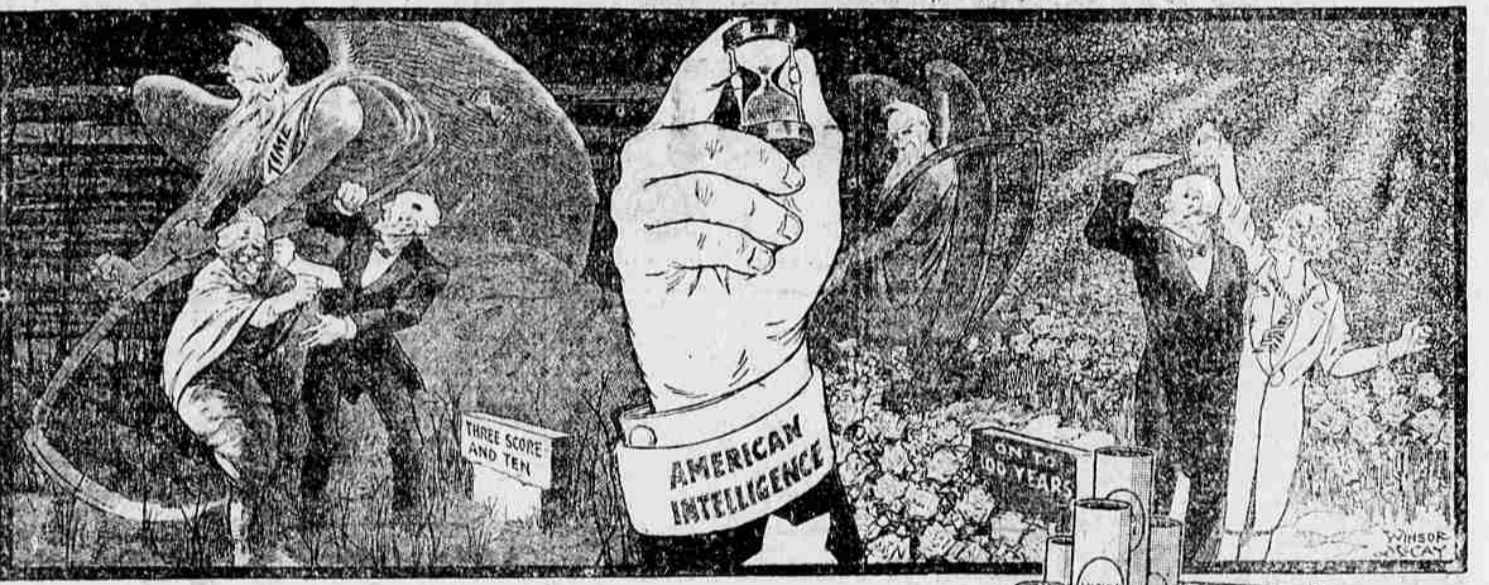
