

HUSKIES TO SEEK THE "BEST" COACH

Enoch Bagshaw, Who Resigned Yesterday, to Finish Out Season.

SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 24 (AP)—Enoch W. Bagshaw began coaching the University of Washington football team out of kindness today. Yesterday the dynamic Littleton, Colo., coach resigned as head coach of the Washington eleven but offered his services for the remainder of the present season.

The student board of control last night accepted Bagshaw's resignation and also his offer to remain in the position of head coach until the conclusion of the Washington-Chicago game November 23. Bagshaw's contract had two more years to run and he will be paid off in full. He will receive approximately \$7,000 for the unexpired term of the contract. The resignation ended a year of strife on the university campus. The student board attempted to dismiss Bagshaw last winter, but it failed. The coach was then requested to resign and he refused.

After a discussion session this year Bagshaw talked the matter over with Earl Campbell, graduate manager and decided to resign.

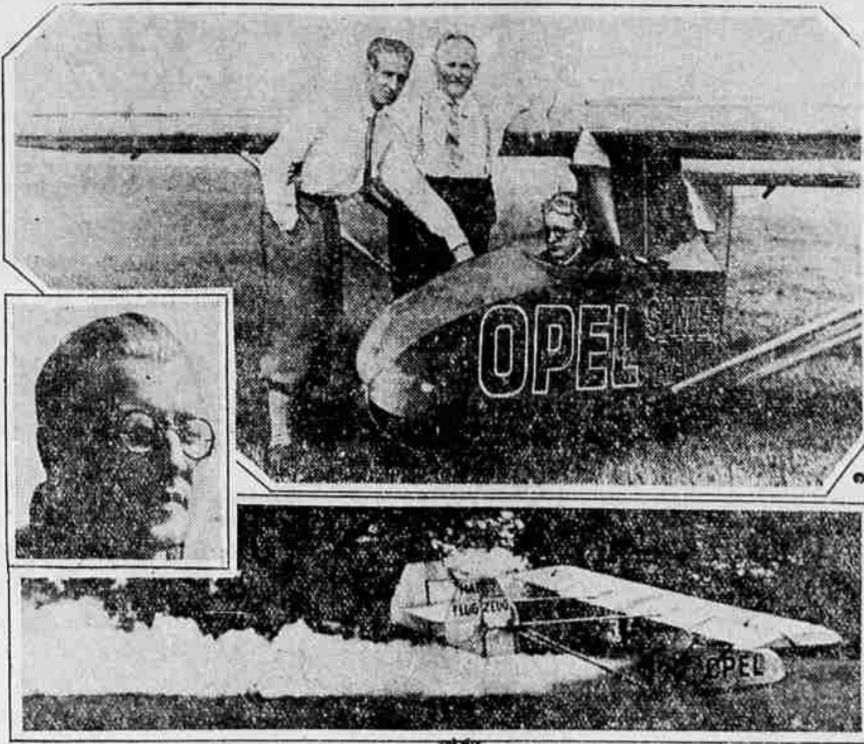
"We will get the best available football coach in the country," declared Campbell in discussing plans for Bagshaw's successor. "Money is no object and our search may cover the entire United States. I plan to leave soon on a tour of the country in search of the right man."

Although no names have been suggested, it is generally understood that Washington has considered several of the outstanding coaches in the country. They include Jess Hawley, Knute Rockne, Skip Madigan, Bob Zuppke, Ted Jones, Dr. J. W. Wiley, Dr. C. W. Spears, Harry Stuhldreher and Gil Dobie.

"Sky-Rocket" Plane Tested in Germany



These photos show how Fritz von Opel, wealthy young German scientist, made the world's first flight in a rocket-propelled airplane. Above you see von Opel in the cockpit of the original ship, named "Sander Base I" after its designer, Friedrich W. Sander. Below, with rockets spurting flame and smoke, it is roaring across a field, almost ready to leave the ground. Note the absence of landing wheels, the plane sliding along on a single, central rail under the blunt fuselage. Later, with a ship of similar construction, the daring von Opel, shown in the inset, made a six-mile flight and now is planning to cross the English Channel in a rocket-powered plane.

Bagshaw's Team To Battle For Him Saturday

SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 24 (AP)—One of their last opportunities to do a good turn for their coach, the University of Washington football players have pledged themselves to "battle our heads off" in the gridiron game against the University of Oregon here Saturday.

During practice yesterday Coach Enoch W. Bagshaw informed his men that he has resigned but that he had offered his services for the remainder of the season. And when work was over for the day the players swooped down on their coach, hoisted him on their shoulders and yelled, "we're for you, Baggy."

Tears fell from Bagshaw's eyes as he told his men that he appreciated their spirit. "But forget what has happened today," said the coach. "Forget it and remember we have some hard games before us. We play Oregon Saturday."

And the players secretly pledged themselves to fight for victory in the Washington-Oregon game.

A hard scrimmage was on the program for the squad today. Bagshaw has been giving his substitutes a good deal of work this evening in a hope of finding some capable reserves. He lacked experienced substitutes in the Washington-Washington State game last week and lost the battle when his first team weakened.

Sonnenberg Is Winner; Referee Action Protested

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 24 (AP)—Some scribbles said today Gus Sonnenberg won his wrestling match with Ed "Strangler" Lewis last night, others said Referee Bob McDonald made a most peculiar decision in awarding him the bout, while the camp of Lewis claimed he should have been given the heavyweight championship. McDonald says Sonnenberg will be champion.

The controversy arose over the third fall, which went into records as the second Sonnenberg had won, and came after a double disqualification and a flying tackle

OFFICIALS TO CONFER ON AIRPORT PROBLEMS

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Municipal airport problems will be laid before a general conference to be held here October 24-25 under joint sponsorship of the American Roadbuilders' association and the Aeronautical Chamber of Commerce.

More than 10,000 city officials have been invited to convene with airport engineers and builders to discuss present practices and future requirements of airport construction. Leading speakers will be Senator Hiram Bingham of Connecticut; David S. Ingalls, assistant secretary of the navy in charge of

aeronautics; William P. MacCracken, Jr., formerly assistant secretary of commerce in charge of aeronautics; Clarence M. Young his successor, and Lieut. Col. G. S. Grant III, director of public buildings and parks.
