BAR LANDRETH OF PENDLETON FROM ATHLETIC BOARD

expected that Pendleton schools will be represented. Word received here this morning indicates that Corvallis High school will assist La Grande High school in the hearing of the protest tomorrow. J. M. Adams, of Corvallis high, declared in a report received at Roy E. Cannon's office in Portland yesterday that at least two of the players under protest—Clayton Crawford and Harold Joell—were from Corvallis and "probably had been solicited." The others in question are Melvin Eilers, of Canby, Ore., Clarence Webber, of Burbank, Cal., and Carol Smith, of Twin Falls, Idaho.

Baker's Side of the Question
The Baker Democrat-Herald, in a news story yesterday, said: "It seems that La Grande admits that technically all four of the boys are eligible to play. An editorial in the La Grande Observer yesterday speaks with some bitterness of Baker's having fulfilled all the legal requirements but charges this city with violating the spirit of the rules, which it thinks is worse."

The La Grande school men also indicated that their case will be built around the theory of bringing in athletes merely to win games, an idea of unorthodoxy, rather than an outright violation of the rules.

The protesters apparently hope to get a new ruling on eligibility different from the one published in the book of the state association. Baker will not oppose change to bar all athletes moving from one town to another until they have earned four credits in their new location, but Baker will oppose its being made retroactive merely to "get" the local school, Mr. Coleman said today. . . . It appears that La Grande, in making a protest on a pretext of this kind, did not act without taking thought. It seems that her spokesmen had conferred with Austin Landreth,

superintendent at Pendleton, and knew how he stood. They also talked to Mr. Cannon, but did not have so direct a commitment from him. If thought the players ineligible "if the facts about their motives in coming to Baker were as La Grande alleged, which is quite another matter. . . . Since Mr. Landreth had already declared Joslin to be disqualified by non-residence and seemed to be working with La Grande in the entire matter, the Baker men saw danger of a "kangaroo court" with the decision against them determined in advance regardless of the evidence. They, therefore, insisted on Mr. Landreth's withdrawal and that the hearing be held in a neutral city before neutral judges.

The Baker school has agreed to accept any ruling the committee makes, but Mr. Coleman said today he will not be satisfied with a ruling contrary to the published rules of the association. A ruling barring the four players could be fairly made, it is held, only on proof of bad faith on the part of the local school. In "importing" the athletes, this it is claimed is not true and hence will not be proved. . . . "I am very sorry this mess has occurred," Mr. Coleman said today. "We want to do what is right in every respect, but we cannot see La Grande's viewpoint. We have already barred three athletes for reasons other than non-residence, including one named in the La Grande protest, and a brother of another named in the protest. If they were here only to play football they would leave school when they saw they could not play, but they remain as students."

The Baker paper further announced that Supt. Coleman, Principal Troy Walker and Coach George Scott would represent Baker in Portland.

As the protest now stands, Corvallis and La Grande High schools are lined up against Baker High school, with the possibility that Pendleton may figure in the question if the board desires to call any witnesses from Pendleton. The protest has been given wide publicity in the entire state, with practically every daily newspaper carrying accounts of the filing of the protest. Baker has carried on a "newspaper trial" of the case for the last few days, but preliminary charges and denials will become past history tomorrow morning, when sworn evidence will be inserted into the state athletic records by both the defense and plaintiffs.

Locally, it is said that La Grande

High school authorities, in gathering evidence for the protest, spent a considerable length of time in making an exhaustive investigation. This accounts, it is said, for the fact that the protest was not filed until Tuesday evening. Inability to secure necessary evidence sooner prevented an earlier filing of the protest.

Walla. The Union Pacific stages began operations through its subsidiary companies, the Interstate Coach and the Gem State Transit between Portland and Spokane and Salt Lake City on September 1. The hook up from Salt Lake City to Denver has just been completed. Service from Denver to Chicago was inaugurated October 10. The same "palace type" motor stages now being used by the Union Pacific in the Northwest will be uniform throughout the entire transcontinental route. These coaches are the latest in motor coach design, equipped to provide comfort and insure safety.

ged by one resolution to ratify the new protocol known as the Rood provision for entrance of the United States into the world court. Copies of this resolution will be forwarded to the United States senators from Oregon.

Smoking Compartments Desired
"We recommend that efforts be made to overcome the evil effects of dangerous cigarette advertising and that steps be taken to prohibit smoking in public eating houses," the resolution reads.

"That separate smoking compartments on stages be provided and that each union give due study and support to the Smoot bill, now before congress, which provides that tobacco shall be put under the pure food and drug act."
