radius city streets that are links in state highways. The committee visiting the board of education will ask that a department be established at the state university for the study of city problems and the assistance of the cities in solving them.

Seek Model Ordinances
Another committee of five city attorneys will be appointed to draw up a model list of city ordinances for presentation to the next convention.

By resolution a committee was provided for to serve with a representative of the University of Oregon State college for research into the subject of city charters. A permanent committee on resolutions and one on legislation were provided for by resolution.

To bolster up the membership of the league, the president and the secretary were authorized to visit all the cities of the state during the next year.

Endorse McNary's Bill
Another resolution endorsed Senator McNary's bill providing for relief from stream pollution.

Dean H. S. Rogers of Oregon State college, who made a survey of the Willamette river, advocated the establishment of sewage disposal plants. Paper mills at various points along the Willamette and the flux industry at Salem were mentioned as highly detrimental to the water.

William J. Locke, executive secretary of the California League of Municipalities, emphasized the power of such an organization in bringing about beneficial legislation or preventing detrimental legislation. He advocated the summoning of legislative candidates before the city councils to determine their policies before election.

Terminable franchises to public utilities were advocated by Prof. Burton O. Schmidt of the University of Oregon. Cities should have the right to terminate a franchise at any time, he said.

No Changes In Price Today In Oregon Market

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 26 (AP)—The better grades of butter continued active with the lower grades apparently less desirable. No price changes were made.

The egg market was also firm, but without change.

In the poultry division supplies were somewhat short and demand brisk for heavy hens.

Fancy turkeys were in unusually good demand. Much undergrade stock is being declined by dealers.

Apples are plentiful, but the demand is equal to the supply.

Reviewing the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland market news service of the United States bureau of agriculture says:

"Carload shipments of fresh fruits and vegetables at Portland took a sudden increase this week, with a total of 130 cars unloaded, compared with 122 cars the previous week, and an advance of about 110 cars weekly for the last two months. This increase is due mostly to greater speculative activity in the potato market on the part of jobbers, restaurateurs, etc., many of whom have purchased relatively large quantities of potatoes in anticipation of future advances. Also, there are almost no competitors from local sources in the potatoes, which are generally in light supply and of only ordinary quality this year. Domestic unloads are as follows: apples 31 cars, grapes 31, pears 29, potatoes 43, and other commodities 29 cars.

"Unloads of apples were greater by 10 cars than last week, but probably due to considerable movement into storage in the city. Apple storage in Portland is still far less than usual; this condition reflecting the smaller crop in all Oregon producing districts. The apple market has been firm during the week, with slight price advances registered in a few cases, as extra fancy delicious which sold at high at \$4.75 per box to Portland retailers. Apple prices ranged downward from this figure to \$1.50 for mixed and inferior, ungraded stock.

"The onion market presents the peculiar condition of a large crop, all harvested and in storage, yet without a single car delivered to Portland this week. This is accounted for by last week's heavy unloads, which are slow in movement into consumption, possibly because of liberal supplies by imported home-grown green onions, which are usually plentiful for this time of year.

"Unloads of 31 cars of grapes during the week have been equalled in volume only one other time this year. With movement of local concerns at their season's peak, total consumption this week was the greatest of the year. Most offerings are of the juicier varieties. The market for good grapes has remained about steady all week, but much southern stock is heavily discounted on account of inferior quality of the offering."

CHICAGO, Oct. 26 (AP)—A \$100,000,000 fund today was placed at the disposal of the American wheat farmer to be loaned out by the federal farm board through the newly organized farmers' National Grain corporation.

WHEAT GAINS TWO CENTS IN MARKET TODAY

CHICAGO, Oct. 26 (AP)—Influenced by indications of big export business on North American wheat and by sharp advances at Liverpool, wheat values here scored brisk upturn today. Crop damage advices from Argentina were a subject of more or less attention. Starting at 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 higher, Chicago wheat reacted somewhat but quickly rallied.

Corn and oats also were firmer, with corn starting 1/2 to 3/4 up, and subsequently holding near the initial range. Provisions tended downward.

Wheat closed firm, 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 a bushel higher than yesterday's finish. Corn closed 1/4 to 1 1/2 down, oats unchanged to 1/2 up, and provisions unchanged to a setback of 2c.
