### A SEASONABLE RECIPE

**Meat Souffle**  
One cup milk.  
Two level tablespoonfuls minute tapioca.  
One-half teaspoonful salt and a dash of pepper.  
Cook in double boiler until the mixture thickens.  
Add one-third cup (or more) ground, cooked meat.  
One beaten egg yolk.  
Cook a few minutes longer.  
Add one beaten egg white.  
Pour into a buttered baking dish and bake in minutes. It has to stand and a little dry mustard to the mixture.
