ant tribute to Ambassador Dawes, recalling that his visit was the result of conversation they had during the summer.

**Keeps to Old Policy**—Mr. MacDonald called attention to the fact that Washington was pursuing its historic policy of keeping free from old-world entanglements but London must remain loyal to the obligations contracted with the League of Nations.

Former Premier Lloyd George, liberal leader, created a storm when, after having congratulated Mr. MacDonald on the success of his mission, he pressed him for answers whether he had entered into any commitments on belligerent rights and general disarmament.

Mr. Lloyd George also wished to know whether war debts had been discussed during the negotiations.

The labor benches howled their disapproval as the liberal leader demanded answers.

Commander J. M. Kenworthy from the labor benches insisted that Lloyd George's queries were only mischievous. Kenworthy was formerly a liberal.

The irrepressible Jack Jones, labor M. P. for Silvertown, lessened some of the tension with a humorous speech, but Mr. MacDonald insisted on coming back at Mr. Lloyd George.

The prime minister declared emphatically that "the question of debts was not discussed." He assured the house that there had been no commitments on the other question.
