Among the baseball post-mortem you can hear it remarked that the American league's amazing streak of world's series triumph is due in a measure to the "solid front" of the junior circuit as contrasted with a lack of unified National league effort.

In other words, American league join hands, slaking pennant-differences in the common cause, when it comes to the big championship, while the National league contender plays a lone hand, so to speak.

A National league man remarked recently to me: "Why the Americans have what amounts to a world's series board of strategy. Their best minds get together to help the club that is in the series. It is a matter of league pride to leave nothing undone to aid the contending club."

"Unfortunately we have no such situation. Nor is the spirit such that it apparently would be welcomed. The manager of a recent National league contender in the world's series, after apparently making some mistakes in playing against the Yankees, was offered some advice from John McGraw and Rogers Hornsby. Two men qualified to speak on the subject. The offer was abruptly rejected and the club lost four straight."

"In advance of another world's series, the manager of a National league club permitted his by-line to appear over a story in which he predicted an American league victory. It had a discouraging effect. No American league manager would have shown such questionable loyalty."

"Take the matter of propaganda," our National league observer went on. "A year ago, we heard a lot about the Yankee 'cripples' before the series with St. Louis. The idea got around that all the Cardinals needed to do was to go out on the field and push Babe Ruth and the rest of them over. The Cards themselves fell for it and you know what happened."

"It may have seemed like a little thing, but it was good American league psychology when Connie Mack declined an invitation for the Athletics to practice on Wrigley field before the series started. It

Stock Exchange Closed Because Of Election Day

NEW YORK, Nov. 5 (AP)—The stock market was closed today because of the election, after an isolated session in which prices showed a net decline of 2 to 17 points on a turnover of 6,262,930 shares.

The rally which was expected when the market opened yesterday after a two-day selling holiday failed to develop, and in its place appeared selling pressure which was the dominant note throughout an orderly session.

The volume of trade and range of prices was regarded by operators as normal contrasted with behavior of the market last week, when, after a wild selling stampede on Tuesday in which 16,140,030 shares were dumped, the market came back sharply in a three-hour session Thursday with gains up to 35 points and a total of 7,149,599 shares.

For the first day since October 24, the beginning of the big slump, the ticker was able to keep close to the market. It closed 30 minutes after the last sale.

Curtailed sessions from 10 a. m. to 1 p. m. tomorrow, Thursday and Friday, with complete suspension of business Saturday, have been ordered by the board of governors of the stock exchange and officials of the curb exchange in a further effort to permit brokerage houses to catch up with the bookkeeping entailed by the tremendous volume of trade last week. It was found that the two-day holiday over the weekend had not afforded sufficient time for overworked staffs to complete their tasks.

WHEAT DROPS TWO TO FOUR CENTS TODAY

CHICAGO, Nov. 5 (AP)—Sharp new setbacks in wheat values here went hand in hand today with Liverpool quotations much lower than looked for. Buying support for the Chicago market was slow to develop, and prices displayed but little power to rally. Opening 1 1/2 to 2 1/4 c. down, Chicago wheat later suffered additional pronounced breaks. Corn, oats and provisions were also weak, with corn starting 1/2 to 3/4 c. off, and subsequently continuing to point downward.

Despite late estimates that 1,500,000 bushels of wheat from North America had been taken today for shipment to Europe, wheat closed unsettled at nearly the day's bottom-most point, 2 1/2 to 4 1/4 c. a bushel under yesterday's finish.

Corn closed to 1 1/2 c. down, oats, 1/2 to 1 1/4 c. off, and provisions unchanged to a setback of 1 c.

Scripps Missing Since October 23

DETROIT, Nov. 5 (AP)—Police of Detroit and Windsor, Ont., have started a search for William J. Scripps, 24, of Detroit, son of W. E. Scripps, publisher of the Detroit News, who has been missing since the night of Oct. 23.

Scripps was last seen in Windsor, where he had gone to confer with Oscar Kuhn in connection with business matters in the Gilders, Inc., of Lake Orion, Mich., of which Scripps is president.

EXPLOSIVE TOBACCO
OREGON CITY, Ore., Nov. 5 (AP)—A .22 calibre cartridge, placed accidentally in with some loose tobacco, exploded in the pipe of M. E. Kandle, 84, here and blew the pipe and part of the stem from his mouth. The cartridge was exploded by the burning tobacco.

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 5 (AP)—Butter prices remained unchanged at the Portland produce exchange today. A decline of 1 cent was reported in the Seattle market.

Butter withdrawals from storage were more than twice as large as last week, while egg withdrawals were less.

Reviewing the fruit and vegetable market, the Portland market news service of the United States bureau of agriculture says:

Receipts of 1800 boxes of apples by truck marks the heaviest daily volume of this fruit delivered to the Portland wholesale market this year. The apple market continues quiet, with prices well stabilized and very few price fluctuations.

Cauliflower shipments have been very light for three or four days, both from Oregon and other producing areas, and local shippers are asking higher prices. Cauliflower sales in Portland are composed mostly of No. 2 stock, of good quality, but not suitable for export shipment.

Current offerings of California grapes show very wide range in quality and condition. Much stock is being heavily discounted on account of poor quality.

Cranberries from Massachusetts are competing with the Oregon-Washington berries, selling to retailers at about 21 cents per pound.

Colony, in early 1920, is higher, ranging from \$2.75 to \$3 per crate, although demand is slow at the latter price.
