A SEASONABLE RECIPE
BRAN MUFFINS WITH RAISINS AND PRUNES.
One egg, beaten.
One cup milk.
One-half cup sugar.
One-half cup cooked prunes, pitted and cut in small pieces.
One-half cup raisins, chopped.
Two cups flour.
One cup bran.
Three teaspoons baking powder.
One-fourth cup margarine, melted.
To egg, milk, sugar, fruit and dry ingredients mixed together, add margarine and mix thoroughly. Pour in greased muffin pans, let rise fifteen minutes and bake at 375 degrees for twenty-five minutes.
