The men who marched today—get their eleven-year-old story and you will understand better why they believe preparedness is the most effective means of preventing future wars. And you will also understand why those who served in 1918 value peace more highly than any other group of American citizens.

Pennsylvania's present automobile code empowers the secretary of highways to suspend the registration of any vehicle deemed unsafe, or unfit to be operated, or not equipped as required by the law. Under it brakes must be in good working condition at all times, and all closed vehicles must be equipped with a windshield wiper or device to clear rain, snow or other moisture from the line of vision. Provisions barring mechanically deficient motor vehicles from the highways would drive hundreds of decrepit and outworn cars and trucks from the roads if properly enforced. And—what is more important—it would help decrease accidents.

A Portland resident writes to the Oregon Voter thus: "We have a belief or rather a conviction that Portland lies in the center of some of the richest hydro power in the world, and that, due to her location in this regard, unequalled elsewhere, she is entitled to rates for power, not merely as low as others, but very substantially lower than any." Which sounds intelligent as far as it goes. The only thing lacking is that the writer doesn't name the rich and marvelously economical waterpower sites, doesn't submit construction and operation figures to bolster up his "conviction." A very common error. People are prone to think that so-and-so could easily be done. Then when they investigate the matter exhaustively they find very few snap "convictions" really based on fact.

THE UNKNOWN SOLDIER

Armistice Day devotions always center about the cenotaphs of the unknown soldiers. Americans are familiar with the stately memorials at Arlington, under the Arc de Triomphe and in Westminster Abbey. But few in the United States realize to what extent the idea of enshrining an unidentified soldier swept over the countries which participated in the World war.

Symbol of the embattled citizenship of his country, an unidentified soldier—of distinguished or humble birth or sprung from the middle class—rests in his pantheon in 10 capitals, and more memorials are proposed. Italy, Hungary, Rumania, Belgium, Poland, Portugal and Turkey have reverently laid their dead away.

So completely and swiftly did the idea sweep over the world that its origin has been lost, or at any rate there are several versions of it. Paris and England both claim the distinction, an army captain in Paris and a London newspaper man being given the credit by their respective countries.

David Lloyd George, when asked about its authorship, remarked:

"I feel quite sure that the individual, whoever he is, would be quite satisfied with the result of his suggestion."

That apparently has been the dignified attitude of the originator, for no one has come forward to establish his paternity of one of the most effective reminders of the diabolical nature of war that has ever found its way into reality.
