

CONSTRUCTION WORK CONTINUES

Permits Issued Last Week For New Home and Three New Garages

In spite of colder weather and occasional storms, building permits in La Grande continue to increase in number. During the last week, following more than \$10,000 the first few days of November, four more were issued, calling for new construction valued at \$2,142.

The permits last week included one for a \$2,000 home, to be erected on Third between Adams and Washington.

The permits to within three thousand dollars of \$325,000 for the year, making 1929 one of the largest years in the city's history for new building, being topped by only two seasons.

The permits issued last week follow:

Nov. 5—Ray Goodnough, for Joe Lukson, to erect a garage on Madison between Elm and Greenwood, to cost \$30.

Nov. 5—J. H. Burk, to erect a garage on U between Spruce and Pine, to cost \$25.

Nov. 6—James Reilly, to build a garage on Ash between X and Y, to cost \$87.

Nov. 8—Ray Goodnough and Kelly, for H. Johnson, to erect a modern home on Third between Adams and Washington, to cost \$2,000.

The enclosed terrace and entrance hall are a few of the outstanding features to be found in the above plan, while others are noticed as we approach the main entrance, where we are impressed with the broad expanse of stone-work of the front wall, which is relieved by the bay window. In the dining-room, with its lead cresting around the top and by the inviting appearance of the rugged front door, which is equipped with an old-fashioned latch string, which is really operated the doorbell. An antique lantern hangs near by.

The low sweeping wall, stucco work and chandeliers forming the upper part of the front wall are all very well chosen materials for this particular house.

Upon entering the front door, we find a rather long, narrow hall instead of the usual square type, wherein a feeling of ancient security pervades. To the left, looking upon the enclosed terrace, is a wide breast of leaded casement windows. The ceiling is rather low and is decorated with many ceiling beams. A flagstone floor, if the pocketbook permits, would complete the ensemble. A large hanging from the ceiling furnished a quiet and subdued light.

French doors lead from the living room to the terrace, which should also be paved with flagging. Entrance to the dining room is very well placed and as in all good plans, the distance from the kitchen to the front door is as short as possible.

The specifications include steel casement south, hardwood floors, tile floor and wainscoting in the bath. The foundation walls are of cement. The basement is cemented, wherein the usual utility features and warm-air furnace are contained.

This house is 28 feet wide and could very easily be contained on a 45-foot lot. It is estimated to cost between \$6,500 and \$8,000, exclusive of heating and plumbing.

Ideals of service which inspired our men in 1917 and 1918 to stake their lives for their country.

Armistice day has a peculiar significance to the men of the Legion because it not only revives cherished memories but it serves to impress upon all veterans their duty of continued service to the nation. A day of joy, though this may be, still it strikes hard and the note of loyalty which characterized the service of our men in time of war and which should characterize their service in time of peace.

Conceived out of the common interests of those who served, the spirit of the American Legion today is the spirit which spurred our men to noble deeds on the field of battle. The Legion is justifying its existence with a program of good citizenship, with untiring devotion to the care of our disabled comrades and dependent children or veterans, advancing the principles of Americanism, and given unselfish service towards the betterment of our city, state and nation.

"Our celebration of this Armistice day, however, would be to no avail if we do not take advantage of the splendid opportunity it affords to pledge anew our allegiance to flag and country, and to reflect upon the duties and obligations which we, as citizens, owe to the nation. The lives, which were snuffed out in the blaze of the World war, will not have been sacrificed in vain if we dedicate our best efforts to the uplift of the nation and to the preservation of those glorious principles of freedom and democracy for which our comrades died."

Bethlehem chapel of the National cathedral, where he is interred, with Bishop James E. Freeman of Washington speaking over a nationwide radio chain. For the first time Mrs. Wilson, the president's widow, was unable to be present, as she is traveling in the orient.

Hoover to Speak
The speech of President Hoover, which is expected to be of great import to the world, will be delivered at 8:30 p. m. tonight at the Washington auditorium. An audience of nearly 20,000 persons is expected to hear him, while over the radio members of the 12,000 Legion posts will "listen in" and at the veterans' bureau hospitals thousands of wounded veterans will be furnished with radio earphone sets so they can hear the chief executive's words.

Another event on the day's program was the decoration of Frank R. Kellogg, former secretary of state, by French Ambassador Claudel with the grand cross of the Legion of Honor, France's highest award, for his part in the negotiation of the treaty for the renunciation of war.
