Produce Markets Steady at Opening

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 12 (AP)—Portland produce markets opened steady today following a week-end of brisk trading. Eggs, which had been gradually ascending, were a little weaker, perhaps due to the two day accumulation or to the fact that hens may be laying more regularly. No change in prices was announced.

Pork has dropped from 1 1/2¢ and 1 1/4¢ to 1 1/2¢, according to a leading produce company quotations. At the same time, veal has gone up from 20 and 22 to 23 cents. Choice veal is somewhat higher at 18 and 19¢.

Turkeys are easier at 32¢ and 34¢.
