Unusual Program Features Meeting Of Club Women

The most unusual and interesting program that has been presented at the Neighborhood club this year took place when the members of the club met in the auditorium of the L. D. S. amusement hall yesterday afternoon with more than 200 present, when they were taken "Around the World" with Mrs. W. P. McAdory.

The members were greeted at the door by persons garbed in costumes of different countries of the world. As the curtain drew back, a tropical scene of palms and green foliage was disclosed with Mrs. McAdory standing at one side before a large globe. She was attired in the costume of a Burmese maiden. The costume is her own, presented to her by three different tribes of Burma. The Shan tribe gave her the bag, the Karen, the Blong, and the Kachin, the skirt, a beautiful creation that required two years in the making.

In the beginning of the program a telegram, which had just been received from Calla Boxy, was read to the club with the words, "Best wishes for your day at Neighborhood club. Am thinking of you as you travel your journey over again."

Musical assistants in the program were Miss Gladys Miller and Mrs. Joe Clark. Floral arrangements were done by Mrs. F. E. Rohan.

Sitting on the opposite of the Burmese maiden, was a Hindu, represented by Mrs. Clyde R. Selts in an elaborate costume. All the costumes in this affair were authentic and very gorgeous.

A striking Spanish maiden dressed in red, with a red lace mantilla, was Mrs. J. D. Meyers, who appeared soon after the curtain rose, and sat near the Hindu.

Mrs. Julius Roesch dressed as an elderly lady from Palestine sat nearer the back and center of the stage.

About three weeks ago, Mrs. McAdory sent notes to club members asking them to help her in this presentation by asking a question of what they would like to know about her trip around the world. These were read to her by the representative from each country which she answered in short interesting talks. Some of the questions were not answered because they are considered in future programs of the organization.

An Egyptian prince and princess, Misses Gilda Ashby and Miriam Hult, danced a dance of Egypt, attired in gorgeous creations of white with gold and pearl trimmings. In a peasant costume of the Italian, Mrs. R. E. Tyler dressed as a Swiss peasant explained the customs of the Swiss peasants in the fall of the year, when the girls make cheeses and the boys bring the cows from the hills, and they all take the cheeses, and the cows, which are draped with garlands of flowers, to the fair. A folk song telling of these events was sung and a dance presented by Clarice Taylor, Fern Broomefield, Jean McKennon, Barbara Coolidge, Dorothy Wall, Cornelia Daly, Mildred Patton, Mildred Miller, Lydia Mae Hollister, and Margaret Dixon, all Camp Fire girls.

Presenting a graceful and attractive dance from Hawaii Mrs. L. E. Westernhaver in a grass skirt with a green bodice, and Miss Catherine Sartano in a red skirt and bodice, appeared.

During the program Miss Mabel Doty of the La Grande public library talked of travel books, giving a list of books, some well-known, telling it in an interesting way that made the listeners want to read each book she mentioned. "Mother India," "Chrysanthemums," "The Isle of Four," "Travels from a Easy Chair," "Spring in Moscow, and Algiers," "Daughter of the Sahara," and "Taj-Mahal," were some of the books discussed.

The buying of a hand over the body led to the discovery Sunday that Herman Alton, 19, had been killed.

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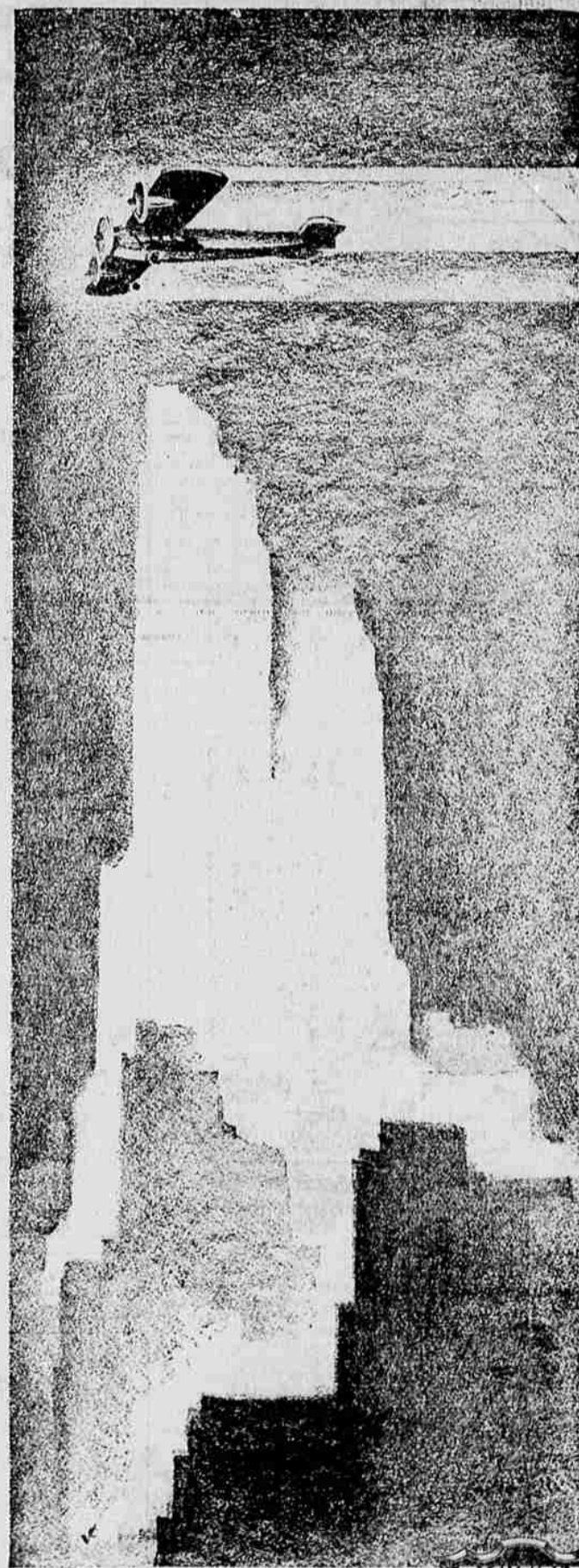
