**G. A. R. Veteran Dies**—George Hillman, of La Grande, has received newspaper accounts following an earlier telegram of his father's death, which occurred in Spooner, Wis., on Oct. 21. His father, T. H. Hillman, was 82 years of age and was well known in La Grande, having spent about six months here winter before last with his son. While in La Grande Mr. Hillman attended the G. A. R. and American Legion meetings regularly—in fact, it was a combination of two posts, as Mr. Hillman was the only surviving member of the Spooner G. A. R., and with his death, the organization past out of existence. He became ill while en route home to Wisconsin, where he spent the remainder of his life. He enlisted in Company H, 65th Illinois Infantry on Apr. 12, 1863, and served until the end of the Civil war. At his funeral, he was accorded full military honors, with the Eskward Moe post of the Spooner American Legion and the Howitzer company of the W. N. G. in charge. During his funeral all business in Spooner was suspended.

## FORMER PRINCESS DEAD; STRANGE ROMANCE ENDED

By her first marriage the former princess was princess of Schumpp, wife of Prince Adolphus of that house. He died in 1916, and for years she lived side by side with other members of the Hohenzollern and Schumpp families; all suffered reverses as a result of the war, of course, but their lot was exalted compared to what awaited Victoria.

**Married to Young Man**—In 1927 she met Zubkoff, 29 years old, who was said to have represented himself to her as a Russian emigre of good family, but was believed really to have been the son of a Cobbler, and to have worked at such professions as waiter and gigolo in a Paris dance hall.

The princess, then 61 years old, and he were married despite the opposition of the former Kaiser, and others of her family who forced her to renounce her royal standing before she went ahead with the late-life romance.

No sooner had they been married at Bonn than young Zubkoff began to attract attention to himself, with escapades in public houses, affairs with other women, and numerous ill-timed and abortive over such matters as had checked.

He finally was expelled from Germany, then from Belgium and at various times later had trouble finding agreeable residence in several countries of Europe. His wife for a while remained attached to him, but finally she left him, and when he reappeared in Germany a few days ago served him with divorce papers.

"Vicky" as she was called, was the favorite grandchild of Queen Victoria of England, for whom she was named. The British queen would her the greatest part of a jewel collection which she had spent years in bringing together. She recently was said to have sold most of these to meet Zubkoff's debts.

According to talk in former court circles the latest method of Zubkoff to extort money was a threat to write a movie scenario in which the courtesan, marriage and relationship of the two would be depicted in an objectionable manner.

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## Gotham Furrier Is Released By Russian Bandits

TIENTSIN, China, Nov. 13 (AP)—Aaron Brenner, New York furrier, arrived here today after nearly a week's captivity in the hands of kidnapers, believed to be Russians. He was in a highly nervous condition and unable to give a coherent account of what had happened to him.

A telephone message was received after he arrived at his home to the effect that "there are 20 of us," and that they would get revenge if his "promise is not kept."

It was believed the "promise" was to pay the ransom demand, which finally was reduced to \$50,000, since Joseph Brenner, brother of the furrier, denied any ransom had been paid to secure his release.

Police were said to be aware of the identity of the kidnapers, and to have located three of them in the Chinese district adjoining the English concession. A raid was planned for this morning. It was believed the gang became frightened at the closeness of the police investigation and permitted the captive to escape.

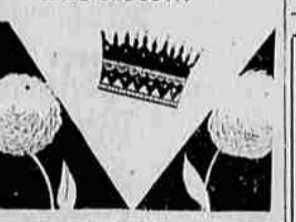
## Klamath Child Is Burned to Death
