Foulds also drew from Adams the admission that the San Francisco-Portland route over the Western Pacific and Great Northern lines would be about 100 miles longer than the Southern Pacific route between those points. Adams added, however, that the Western Pacific and the Great Northern will match the running time of the Southern Pacific between Portland and San Francisco.

The Western Pacific president said his company would start running one train daily each way as soon as the new line is completed.

## Senators Vote Down Move For An Adjournment

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14 (AP)—Overriding the two party leaders, the senate today refused by a vote of 61 to 31 to take a week's recess before the regular session of congress beginning December 2. The senate had just refused to postpone consideration of the tariff until December 9, by a vote of 74 to 7.

Senator Blaine, Democrat, South Carolina, who issued most of the warnings about the senators health offered the postponement motion. He, however, found only Bingham, Connecticut; Dale and Greer, Vermont; Phillips, Colorado, and Reed, Pennsylvania, republicans, and Copeland, Democrat, New York, ready to join with him in voting for a rest.

A reduction of \$100,000,000 on collections from incomes of the current calendar year, is expected to be offset to a large extent by increased incomes on which taxes must be paid. It has been the experience of the treasury that each tax reduction has resulted in larger receipts by the government.

## HAWLEY PREDICTS ACTION

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14 (AP)—Tax reduction "before Christmas" was the promise made today by Chairman Hawley of the House ways and means committee which must initiate legislation to carry out the treasury proposal for a \$100,000,000 revenue cut.

Hawley said the suggested reduction would cost the government only about \$85,000,000 in the current fiscal year. In the next fiscal year, he said, earnings could recoup the reduction if revenues

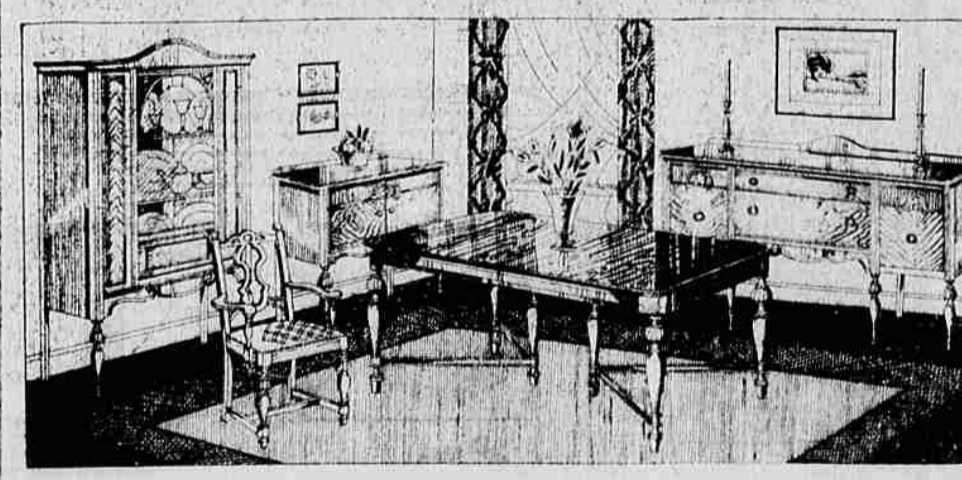
