

BASEBALL'S IRON MAN DEAD TODAY

Joe McGinnity, Who Played Ball Over 32 Years, Victim of Tumor.

NEW YORK, Nov. 14 (AP).—Joe McGinnity, who from 1900 to 1932 was the pitching staff of the New York Giants, died at the home of his daughter in Brooklyn today. He was 53 years old.

He had been victim of a slow but insidious cancer which he had after an operation for the removal of a tumor.

His baseball career extended over 32 years, beginning in 1900, when he was 19, and ending only four years ago, in Duluth, Minn., where as player-manager he pitched twenty games at the age of 53.

He was first called the "Iron Man" when as a member of the Brooklyn team he pitched six winning games against Pittsburgh in seven days without the demand for the team.

He joined the big league in Baltimore in 1909 and continued as one of the famous pitchers of his day for almost ten years. He came to Brooklyn in 1920 when a reduction of the National League resulted from twelve to eight clubs brought about a merger of the two leagues.

At the start of the 1931 season he joined the Baltimore Orioles, then under the guidance of John J. McGraw, and when McGraw came to New York he joined the New York Giants to come with him. He remained with McGraw during the remainder of his major league career.

McGinnity figured prominently in the Giants' pennant victories of 1924 and 1925 and pitched two games in the 1925 world series against the Athletics. In June of 1926 he strengthened his claim to fame by winning three double-headers. The triumphs of 1926, however, marked the peak of his career, although he continued with the Giants until 1932. He won with Newark, the following year and thereafter played on numerous minor league teams until his retirement.
