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## FIVE BIG GAMES OVER THE NATION

### Trojan-Rambler Contest Heads List With 120,000 to Witness Battle.

NEW YORK, Nov. 15 (AP)—The odds are with the home forces in the big conflicts of the gridiron tomorrow. If Soldier Field is considered as "home" for Notre Dame in its clash with the Trojans of Southern California.

In the five games of most significance as far as the championship situation is concerned, nationally, the Hoosiers figure to start with an advantage over Southern California. Pittsburgh appears to have the edge over Carnegie Tech.

Tennessee is a slight favorite over Vanderbilt in the outstanding southern fray. Purdue seems preferred to Iowa and Yale looks too strong for the Princeton Tiger.

It will take tomorrow's fray to determine whether the heaviest movement among the favorites is still on, with the underdogs again enjoying a field day such as they had last week.

### 300,000 at Five Games

One of the outstanding features of these outstanding games tomorrow is that while less than 50,000 spectators will witness the Tennessee-Vanderbilt and Purdue-Iowa games, because of the limited facilities, approximately 250,000 will see the other three games.

Close to 120,000 fans are expected to pack huge Soldier Field for the Notre Dame-Southern California contest, with 75,000 in the Yale bowl and more than 60,000 in Pitt stadium.

The Iowa-Purdue battle, with the Big Ten championship aspirations of the Hoosiers at stake, would just about pack any arena in the Middle West but the capacity of the Ross-Ade stadium at Lafayette is not much over 20,000. The same thing is true of the Tennessee-Vanderbilt contest, which involves the Southern conference title hopes of each team.

In nearly every sector of combat tomorrow promises to witness close and exciting action between old rivals. In the east, Cornell stakes an unbeaten record against Dartmouth with at least an outside chance of victory. Colgate is the favorite against Syracuse but this ancient rivalry is replete with the evidence of upsets.

In the Big Ten, with Iowa and Purdue holding the spotlight, Minnesota and Illinois will attempt to keep within striking distance of the top by seeking the scalps of Michigan and Chicago respectively. Defeat for Purdue will scramble the entire situation.

### Nebraska After Title

Nebraska will move a notch toward the Big Six title if it triumphs over Oklahoma, although the Cornhuskers still have the Kansas Aggies and Iowa State to meet.

After an epidemic of scoreless battles, the Southwestern conference hopes to produce more delect-

ive action when Baylor meets Southern Methodist and Texas-Jackson Christian. All four are in the championship scrap.

### THOMAS HILL IN SNOW

APHERSON, Kan., Nov. 15 (AP)—After a layoff during which they spent two hours collecting through a drift in six inches of snow, University of Southern California's griders were again enroute to Chicago today, where they meet Notre Dame tomorrow.

Coach Howard Jones, as he searched his 41 men rolling, sliding and tumbling in the snow, said every player was in the pink of condition. He ventured the opinion that not more than a half dozen of the squad ever had made such close contact with snow before and it seemed to give added vigor to the workout of men accustomed to the more languorous California climate.

Boxing, after a somewhat protracted slump from the viewpoint of gate receipts as well as competition, seems about due for a comeback this winter.

Several factors have helped the retrenching process. The punch needed in the heavyweight division, after a long lapse, has been supplied unexpectedly by Jack Sharkey. The decisive victory of Mickey Walker over Ace Hooper at Los Angeles for the middleweight title served to quiet widespread rumors of a "business deal." The return of popular Jimmy McLarin as a welterweight, with the show of stuff that made him a great lightweight card a year ago, has aroused interest.

The flyweights have a new sensation in the little French wallflower, But, and both heavyweights have a chance to do something for the division Tommy Loughran (welter). Top of the best early winter offerings at Madison Square Garden are the Scott-Von Forst heavyweight bout and the Goldstein-McLarin welterweight scrap. Both should lead to championship tests, for the heavyweight survivor is due to mingle with Jack Sharkey among the palms at Miami in January or February while either Ruby Goldstein or Jimmy McLarin figures to make it interesting for the new welterweight titleholder, Jackie Fields.

Goldstein has sprung back into the area, to be reckoned with again after wasting a good share of his prospects under the bright lights. When he is in condition and in the mood to fight, Ruby of the Hawks has the speed and punch to dazzle even a McLarin. In natural ability Goldstein impressed critics as another Benny Leonard, but so far he has not shown much consistency.

## Campus Warfare Results In Egg Attack On Dean

DES MOINES, Nov. 15 (AP)—Student revolt against the attitude of Drake university authorities toward the campus warfare which Iowa State college as a prelude to the school's football game at Ames tomorrow (closed) into open indignation early today with a riotous egg bombardment of the home of Dr. O. Davies, dean of men.

Davies last night refused to consider a petition asking for the reinstatement of six Drake students who were suspended for painting signs on Iowa State buildings and stenciling yesterday. He told the group who presented the petition that it would have to come through the student council before he would consider it.

In retaliation, a dozen or more students came to his home shortly after midnight this morning and as 1 a. m. rushed to the house and placed the front of it with eggs. They disappeared in three automobiles before they could be identified.

Shortly before the egg episode, an edify of Dean Davies, bearing a sign "Dean Hawkshaw" was hurled on the campus in front of the administration building.

The six suspended students included all the Drake cheer leaders. More than 200 students signed the petition asking that they be reinstated to lead the cheering section at Ames Saturday. Davies, upon hearing of the petition, remarked, "It will not matter a great deal to me if there are no cheer leaders."

Both the Iowa State and Drake campuses received deluges of paint as a result of yesterday's activities, students from each school including the other's campus.

### U. P. Pays \$75,330.31 For Union Co. Taxes
