Portland Police Officer Suicides

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 15 (AP)—A. O. Abbott, 44, Portland policeman, hanged himself in the bathroom of his home late last night, police finding the body of their dead comrade hanging from the top of the door with a towel about his neck.

Abbott, who had been on sick leave since June 1, 1928, shot and killed an automobile thief at that time and Chief of Police Jenkins said today he believed the shooting undid the man's nerves.
