ELIJAH GUTHRIDGE (Contributed)

Elijah Guthridge was born in Henry County, Mo., March 30, 1861 and died Nov. 11, 1929 at the age of 68 years, 7 months and 11 days. He was married to Sarah J. Lash in Henry County, Missouri and moved with his family to La Grande thirty years ago. Twenty months ago he suffered a stroke of paralysis from which he never recovered. He was a member of the Central Church of Christ of La Grande and was a regular attendant until he was stricken. He leaves besides his wife, four sons and one daughter: J. H. of Milwaukee, Wis., Al of Baker, Okla., of La Grande and Wesley of Tekon, Wash., and Frances, Fleethman of La Grande. All the children except the oldest son, J. H., were present at the funeral. He was detained on account of the serious illness of his daughter. Besides those there were 17 grandchildren.
