E. O. N. Makes Long March

In the second quarter the Mountaineers found themselves after the first few plays, and after intercepting two Monmouth passes, Dougery getting both of them, started a march from their 45-yard line. A sideline play put the ball in the field, and Rust shot a long pass to Dougery for a 22-yard gain. Monmouth, however, intercepted a pass to stop the march, and after Harrison was thrown for a six-yard loss, kicked to La Grande's 22-yard line.

Rust passed to Beard for 15 yards on the edge of the field. After a sideline play, Dougery flipped off a tackle and broke through for 19 yards. Sarrett, on a criss cross, made 15 yards, putting the ball about 20 yards from the Monmouth goal. Beard plowed through the line for seven yards on two plays and Carden took a criss cross for eight yards and first down on Monmouth's 15-yard line. Rust tore off tackle for four and a half, and then two attempts at passing failed, setting the Mountaineers back to the 15-yard line with the count fourth down and 10 to go. McCully called for another pass, and Beard took it on the two-yard line. A line play netted part of the distance and McCully vent over on a center snap. Rust kicked goal making the score 14 to 7.

Rust Punt 62 Yards

In the third quarter, neither team could gain consistently, although Eastern Oregon made four first downs to the visitors' one. Rust got off a beautiful 62-yard punt about the middle of the period. Both teams resorted to frequent passes in the first of the final quarter, but most of them

were knocked down. Finally Rust intercepted a Monmouth aerial thrust on Monmouth's 32-yard line, but on the next play the line gave way, and he was thrown for a nine-yard loss. From there, Rust flipped the ball to Carden for a 26-yard gain. Dougery tore off seven yards and added another on the second play, making it first down on the eight-yard line. Beard made four yards on two terrific smashes, boring through the hunched Monmouth line. On the fourth down, Rust booted a perfect place kick between the bars for three points.

Monmouth threw caution to the winds after that, throwing pass after pass, working the ball to Eastern Oregon's 48-yard line where they were forced to punt. Monmouth sent in for Rust, fumbled and Monmouth recovered on the 22-yard line. A pass netted nine yards but on the next play, the field in semi-darkness and illuminated by a bright moon, the visitors fumbled and La Grande recovered. As the flamer's gun sounded, Sullivan slipped around right end for a 14-yard advance, almost setting through for a touchdown, the safety downing him on Monmouth's 41-yard chalk line.

Clean, Smooth Ball

The game was unusually free from long penalties and fumbling, both teams playing clean and smooth ball. Both were fighting hard every minute, but the Mountaineers superior playing swept the Western Oregon team aside. From end to end, the E. O. N. line played excellent ball, holding its own on the offense and at times, breaking through the opposing forwards on the defense to hurry plays and check yard-gaining thrusts. Sarrett and Carden, ends, figured in several advances, taking passes and carrying the ball on criss cross plays for big gains. Crawford started the game and alternated in both halves with Young at tackle, while Barker held down the opposite tackle, all three playing a strong brand of ball. Barker was in nearly every play along with Sarrett. Irwin and Poser were aggressive guards and Houshens played an excellent game, accurately snapping back the piskin to the backs through-out.

Beard and Rust, however, had the lion's share of glory, with Dougery and Sarrett close seconds. Beard, many times when the line held firm, bored through for yards, and took several forward passes from Rust and Dougery. Rust failed to make much yardage on running plays, but his accurate passing, consistent punting and interception of passes placed him among the star players. McCully played a wonderful game at quarterback, calling his plays just right to catch the opponents by surprise. Emerson and Jones played a strong game in the backfield for Monmouth, accounting for much of the yardage. The Monmouth interference was excellent, giving their speedy backs time to get under way most of the time. Phillips, fullback, and Boring, guard, who did not start because of re-

Murder Confession on Sound Film



"I talked a while with her, and her father went upstairs . . . I said, 'Lee, don't leave me' . . . Then I went crazy and pulled my gun and shot her . . . There were thrills a-plenty in the talking movie shown to judges, criminologists and police officials in Philadelphia the other day. For it was an actual sight-and-sound record of a murder confession, and part of the film is pictured above. William E. Peters, who admitted killing Miss Leona Plischbach, appears at the left, and at the right are Philadelphia's Detective Inspector William Connolly, who questioned the prisoner, and an official stenographer. The confession is recorded on the left of the film, between the pictures and the perforations. Judges said such sound films probably would be admissible as courtroom evidence, and that they would be a great aid in preventing retractions of confessions.

Lower Grades Of Butter Drop One Cent; Rest Firm

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 16 (AP)—Lower grades of butter declined 1 cent at the Portland produce exchange today, while the higher grades held firm.

Egg prices remained steady. Reviewing the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland news bureau of the United States department of agriculture says:

An excited lettuce market was the feature of the wholesale fruit and vegetable trade. The last dry-packed lettuce of the current season from the northwest probably made its appearance from The Dalles and sold to retailers at \$3 per crate. Some field-frosted stock was discounted from this price, however. California lettuce, four-dezen size, is moving readily at \$4 per crate. Quality is very good. Movement of wrapped and packed apples is slow, on account of the continued heavy receipts of cookers and ungraded stock; the poor keeping qualities of which necessitate the prompt movement into consumption. Little real activity is expected in quality apples until this early stock is disposed of—which will probably not occur until New Year's.

Cauliflower and celery shipments continue light, quality is very good. Eastern demand is fairly active, and the market continues at very satisfactory levels; carlot sales of cauliflower being made at \$1.30 to \$1.40 cash, and celery at \$2.25 per crate, in the rough.

OREGONIAN PROMOTED

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 16 (AP)—Miles McKee, assistant attorney general for Oregon, has been promoted by the war department from major to the rank of lieutenant colonel in the Oregon National Guard. He is with the coast artillery division. McKee served six years in the National Guard before the World war, and later saw service at the Presidio.

FATALLY BURNED

SCHANTON, Pa., Nov. 16 (AP)—Carl S. Moriska, 58, a prominent civil engineer, was fatally burned today when police and fire officials said, he poured gasoline on his clothing and set himself afire at his home here. His wife, who attempted to prevent the act was seriously burned.

the state game farms had released a great number of game birds and still had a large number to release. The same condition was reported for the hatcheries. The various hatcheries of the state this year planted in the streams and lakes 25,000,000 large steel trout, besides the other varieties which were hatched and distributed. He told of the reputation the hatchery and game farm managers have achieved by citing the fact that birds are coming in continually from other states to send them experienced men to take charge of their ponds and farms. After telling the boys that our little club was cited among the most active in the state he urged the members to do all in their power to back up the wardens in their work.

Game Warden Introduced

Warren Cornell, county warden, discussed the work of a game warden and emphasized the fact that enforcement of the laws was only one of the several duties of these officers. He was required to perform. He advocated having the open season for various birds and for deer at different dates. This he claimed, would facilitate the work of the wardens and make for better hunting. He also claimed there should be one connected season for pheasants.

A. B. Hunter, Secretary of the

La Grande chamber of commerce and ardent sportsman, prophesied that in time all farms along good fishing streams would be bought up by sportsmen, a condition which already obtains along the best waters in Southern Oregon. Many of the owners of these farms are from other states and their main object is securing the land to have a place to which they can go and have good fishing.

Baker Plans Feed

Pat Baker, secretary of the Baker Rod and Gun club, invited the sportsmen to a venison feed in Baker December 2 and 3 and 4. Below the Baker county warden spoke about the work of his office.

Local hunters urged the approving of a resolution to change the deer season, so that any closing of the season on account of fire hazard could be compensated for by adding to the length of the season. President Dougery said that there would probably be a meeting of the Eastern Oregon club officers of representatives from the various clubs of this part of the state to recommend legislation at the next session of the state legislature.
