Bertha Carper, small daughter of Walter Carper, returned to her home Friday evening after spending two weeks with her sister, Sadie

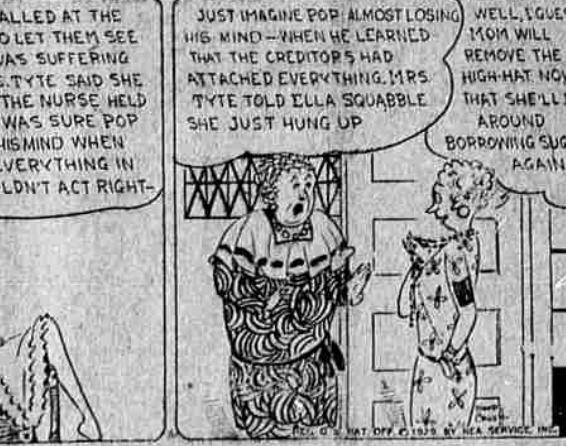
