Mrs. G. J. Frankel Guest At Dinner In The La Grande

A delightful host dinner was given last evening at the La Grande hotel by the Neighborhood club of La Grande in honor of Mrs. G. J. Frankel, president of the Oregon Federation of Women's Clubs.

Following dinner Mrs. Frankel spoke to a group in the gold room about the bi-annual convention of the national organization of women's clubs, telling of many interesting events that occurred while she was in Massachusetts attending one. Telling of her visit to the house of seven gables with its winding stairways and secret passages Mrs. Frankel said she had brought some hollyhock seeds away with her, but of course she paid for them.

She mentioned Julia Ward Howe, considered to be one of the greatest women of Massachusetts, and Kathryn Lee Bates, the author of the song "America the Beautiful."

The time is not far distant when the colleges and universities will have a regular course for the right use of leisure. "We are living too fast," the president said, also emphasizing religious training in the home.

"The elimination of waste is the beginning of thrift for schools, home, club, individuals, and to all country industrial farms are marked improvements on the county jails for the care of the youthful delinquent," she continued.

"The federation of women's clubs is for the Volstead act without any alteration," she stated.

"Foreigners are now encouraged to keep their own individualities and folk songs, instead of rapidly becoming Americanized, as was formerly the way they were encouraged."

"The vast army of home makers is not now appearing under the head of no occupation, as it has

been in former census." She commented upon Mrs. E. P. Mossman's work as chairman of the art committee of Oregon, remarking that this work in Oregon exceeded that of many other states in its thoroughness and resourcefulness.

In conclusion she mentioned the scholarship loan fund.
