**Wheat Advances Nearly 5 Cents In Price Today**  
CHICAGO, Nov. 19 (AP)—Wheat values advanced 4 1/2 cents a bushel today and closed for the day at net gains of 3 3/4 to 4 1/2 cents under the stimulus of heavy buying by easterners and extension of damage from black rust to the Argentine wheat crop.

The finish was at \$1.23 1/2 to \$1.24 for December wheat futures, March \$1.31 1/4 to 1/4; May \$1.24 1/2 to 3/4 and July \$1.35 1/4.

In parts of the Argentine province of Cordoba the wheat crop was described as near failure because of the black rust damage intensified by sultry weather. The growing optimism in the stock markets was felt in the grain pit, brokers said, and buying was larger and more general than for several days.

**Xmas Packages Due Shortly For Friends Abroad**

If one has a friend in New Zealand and wants to send him or her a Christmas present, one has exactly three shopping days left—if one lives in New York!

As far as mailing packages to foreign countries, the Christmas season is already here, according to Postmaster Ralph Huron. He gives the following dates on which articles must be mailed to reach foreign countries by Dec. 25:

Azores Islands, Dec. 5; Belgium, Dec. 14; Brazil, Dec. 6; Canal Zone, Dec. 14; China, Nov. 25; Cuba, Dec. 21; Denmark, Dec. 14; Egypt, Nov. 29; England, Dec. 14; France, Dec. 14; Greece, Dec. 7; Hawaii, Dec. 12; Ireland, Dec. 14; Italy, Dec. 10; Japan, Dec. 2; Netherlands, Dec. 14; New Zealand, Nov. 22; Palestine, Nov. 29; Panama, Dec. 14; Philippine Islands, Nov. 25; Porto Rico, Dec. 19; Russia, Dec. 7; Scotland, Dec. 14; Sweden, Dec. 14; and Virgin Islands, Dec. 19.

"If the country you are interested in doesn't appear here, try to find one near it," Mr. Huron said, adding that anyone desiring further information may ask at the post office.

Mr. Huron urges that packages to go to foreign countries be mailed earlier, if possible, than the dates quoted above, to avoid the rush at their destination. The dates given are the time of dispatch from New York.

**BOOK WEEK IS OBSERVED BY CITY LIBRARY**

In observance of children's book week the public library has a delightful exhibit of children's books as possible suggestions for parents who are planning to make this a book Christmas for their children.
