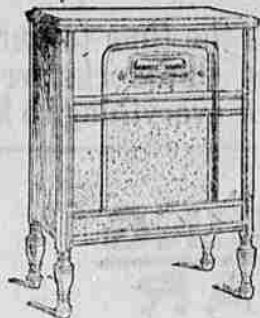

With a "we will win" spirit that bodes no good for the Red and White, the conference leading Bears worked long and hard to perfect their crashing attack and an invulnerable defense. Only this game might be bagged for the Bears to claim the 1929 Pacific coast conference championship. A defeat would be like slamming the door to the crown jewels in their faces.

Enthusiasm and excellent condition prevailing throughout the entire eleven were notable features of the Bears' practice sessions. The possibility was seen that a shift in the backfield would be made for the game Saturday. Moose Garrity, a junior, was being groomed to replace Rusty Gill, husky sophomore, at fullback. The remainder of the backfield found Lee Eisan at quarter, and Ed Griffiths and Benny Lem at the halves.

The Bears will leave in a couple of days for a rest in the country before hurling their offensive at their ancient rivals.

Orange Eleven Facing Strong Foe in Detroit

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, Nov. 20.—Detroit university football team, one of the leading in the middle west, will be Oregon State's inter-sectional opponent Saturday at Detroit in the last game of the season for the Orange. The Detroit Titans under Gus Duran present a formidable eleven which has 24 wins to its credit. The Orangemen with Coach Paul J. Schlischer at the helm have proved colorful in games with teams from other parts of the country.

Since Schlischer came to Oregon State in 1924 the Orangemen have played four inter-sectional games, losing the first to Nebraska, winning the next from Maryland, at Milwaukee, Wis., tied 14 to 14 with Carnegie Tech at Portland, and took a sensational 25 to 13 decision over New York university last year. At least three all-Americans have played against Oregon State in these games including Howard Harpster, quarterback, and Flash Yoder, tackle, of Carnegie Tech, and Ken Strong, half-back, of the N. Y. U. Violets. Another team in Lloyd Brazil, Detroit halfback and consistent ground gainer.

Living Brege Nozler, Oregon State's mid-field 138 pound quarter-back, will be Lester Vachon, 141 pound signal barker for Detroit. Nozler showed considerable speed in returning punts this year especially against Southern California, while reports from Detroit indicate that Vachon is likewise fast, gaining the nod over his heavier opponents as first team field general.

The Orangemen will leave De-

troit at 11:20 Saturday night and will arrive in Corvallis next Wednesday evening.

There no longer need be any public concern over the old age of the venerable Mr. George Herman Ruth.

Mr. Ruth, in fact, has become a solid citizen with an investment trust of \$150,000, yielding a modest \$12,000 annually, all fixed up and ready for him whenever he ceases to draw his \$70,000 or more from the vaults of Colonel Jacob Ruppert and the Yankees.

All the money derived from the "by-products" of Ruth's fame, from the underwear and candy endorsements, from the athletic equipment and shaving cream, goes into the trust fund handled by Christy Walsh, Ruth's business adviser and manager.

There is not much likelihood that Ruth will have any cut in salary when he signs a new contract for 1930 or for another term of years. There was no loss to the Yankees in the three-year agreement, calling for a total of \$210,000, that Ruth signed in Colonel Ruppert's brewery office in February, 1927, to become the highest paid figure in the game, topping even Commissioner Landis, who gets \$55,000.

The Yankees won two world's championships and Ruth set a new home run record of 60 following the signing of this contract. In spite of illness, the Babe came back to lead all the circuit clouters for 1929.

The Babe, although no doubt slowing up, has lost little if any of his hitting eye. His value to the Yankees is not alone in his hitting. Whether or not Ruth's hitting is in some way capitalized by making him manager of the Yankees, it is certain he holds a fixed and vital place in the club's scheme of things.

For these reasons, as well as Ruth's record for the past three years at the highest salary in base-

Gloomy Tales Emerging From Palo Alto Camp With Game Nearing

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal., Nov. 20 (AP)—Facing a difficult battle Saturday against the tough conference leading Bears of the University of California, the most formidable foe they will meet this football season, the Cardinals of

Stanford university were having their troubles today, and the prospects were not so bright.

Although several of the Cardinals were not in the pink of condition most of the eleven will see service in Saturday's fray. It was certain, however, that Harry Hinton, crack halfback, would not be in the line-up, for study twisted his ankle in the game last Saturday with Santa Clara. Thus the Stanford team is left with only two left half-backs, Lud Prentiss and Phil Moffat. The latter also was considerably battered by the flying hoofs of the Broncos. But at least he can still do some practice.

It is admitted that the general condition of the team, physically, is not up to standard. The trouble is not much with new injuries, as with old troubles that have kept men out of play throughout the season. However, Coach Warner is proceeding as best he can, and regular practice sessions are being held daily. The team will move out for a nearby country club Friday night.

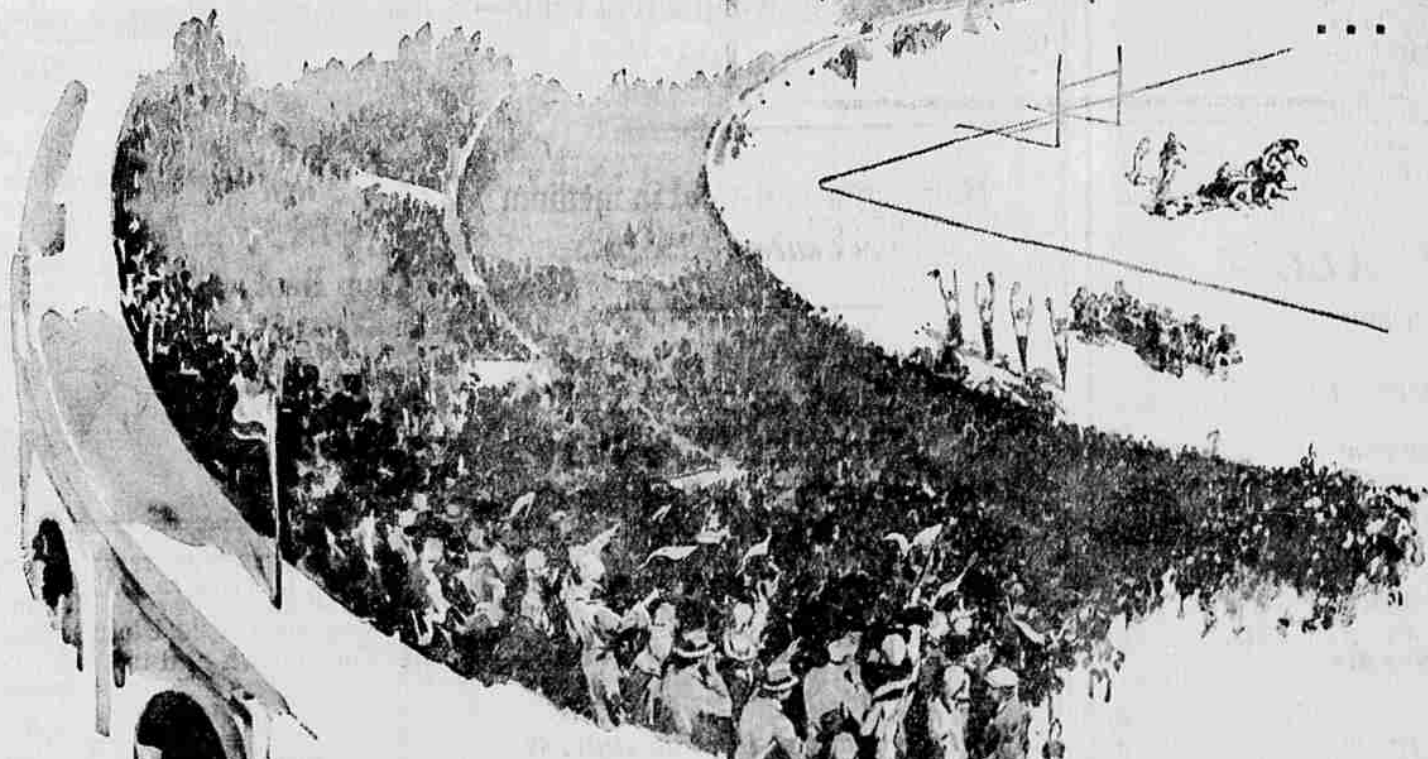
