French Lingerie Slump in U. S.

PARIS (AP)—The fact that fewer American women are wearing French underwear this year than were in 1928 is a symbol of declining expenditures of French wearing apparel, and it has French manufacturers worried.

Figures issued by the minister of finance show that lingerie and women's wear exported from France to the United States the first eight months of 1929, fell by one seventh of 1928, and the exports for a similar period in 1928.

There is talk of a commission to the United States to find out why American women wear less French lingerie and fewer French dresses.

Some exporters lay the blame on consumption on the continent and others say that it is just because modern women have eliminated everything but the essentials. But that explanation doesn't satisfy the nervous-minded analysts.

If they studied the advertising of New York newspapers available in Paris they might have part of the answer without leaving home.

Department store ads show that American women can get machine-made copies of the French underwear at prices which appreciably cut down the demand for genuine French hand-made lingerie.

Machine stitching or handwork, it's much the same to the average American woman, providing the style is right and the material good. She prefers a copy of \$4.95 to an original at four times the price.

The same situation is found in dressmaking. Even the highest type of dressmaker in France complains that America is buying less. Yet the famous dressmaking names of France have never been so widely known or extensively advertised in the United States as they are today.

There is much discouragement among manufacturers and exporters over the increased production costs and tax situation.

One exporter told the Associated Press correspondent: "We find ourselves surrounded by a tariff wall we can't see over. As if that were not enough our taxes are insupportable. I figure that I worked 214 days for the government out of 364 last year in order to pay my business turnover and personal income taxes and all the other taxes I incur."
