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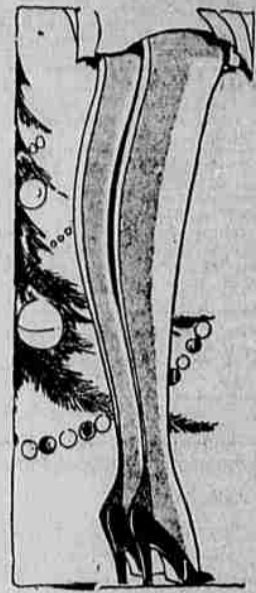

### MENUS

By Sister Mary

Sometimes the salad question for winter menus assumes alarming proportions. The housewife realizes the necessity of some uncooked food, but her resources seem limited and she falls into the head lettuce rut. Too often when lettuce is used only for the "salad green" it is not eaten and is a waste of money as well as food. "Fry" or crisp and minced lettuce may help to overcome this difficulty. Shredded lettuce and the tiny leaves from the heart of head lettuce can be combined with other salad material to good advantage. This insures some of the valuable vitamins being eaten even if the "bed" of lettuce is untouched. However, there are several other raw foods available for winter use. Cabbage, carrots, celery and apples are cheap and wholesome. These combine with most fruits and furnish the raw element. They can be used as inexpensive "stretchers" for more costly material.  
**Hearty Salads Available**  
Cream cheese and nuts, peanut butter, dried fruits, canned fruits and vegetables and jellied combinations all are suitable and appetizing for winter salads. Hearty salads of meat, fish or eggs are usually wanted for special occasions and seldom find a place in the regular menu.  
Tomato jelly is an excellent substitute for fresh tomatoes and its bright red color makes it particularly desirable for the holiday season if a party luncheon or dinner salad is wanted. The trick of scooping out the center of individual molds of a clear jelly and filling the center with extra material is worth keeping in mind.  
Bright red apples, carefully washed and polished make a most attractive salad cut petal-fashion

almost to the blossom end. The core should be carefully removed and the center filled with any preferred combination well moistened with salad dressing. The "petals" must be cut narrow enough to make the salad easy to eat.  
Jellied beet salad is of a pretty red and white color if shredded cabbage is used in place of lettuce. If lettuce is used, choose the greenest rather than a well bleached head for the sake of the color.  
**Jellied Beet Salad**  
Two tablespoons granulated gelatin, 1-2 cup cold water, 1-2 cup vinegar or lemon juice, 1 cup boiling beet juice, 4 tablespoons sugar, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 1 cup diced boiled beets, 1 cup diced celery.  
Scrub three or four small beets thoroughly and cook until tender in boiling water. Reserve 1 cup water in which beets were cooked. Slip skins from beets and cut in neat cubes. Soften gelatin in cold water for five minutes. Add beet juice reheated to the boiling point and stir until gelatin is dissolved. Add sugar, vinegar and salt and let stand until beginning to thicken. Add vegetables and turn into individual molds dipped in cold water. Place in a cold place for several hours or overnight to chill and become firm. Serve on a bed of shredded lettuce or cabbage with mayonnaise or French dressing.
