## GRANGE HALL

Many, many times the question is asked, sometimes by grangers themselves, "What has the grange accomplished?" Some time ago the state grange executive committee met and at the conclusion of a lengthy discussion on the subject it was decided that a large placard with a list of the accomplishments of the National Grange be printed and sent to every grange in Oregon. In October each organization received the placard with the following list of achievements of the National Grange printed on it:

Created in 1872, sentiment that caused the interstate commerce commission to come into existence.

Is responsible for the establishment of real agricultural and industrial colleges. The victory won single-handed, has been worth all the grange has ever cost.

Won, without help and with much opposition, its fight to es-

establish a department of agriculture, its necessary to be in the president's cabinet.

Endorsed woman's suffrage as far back as 1872. From the first the grange has admitted women members in full equality with men.

Opposed, in 1877, the admission of Chinese into the country.

The prohibition amendment to the constitution had the unanimous support of the grange and from the first the grange was a strong advocate for prohibition.

Endorsed the Australian ballot system in 1879.

Actively supported the establishment of agricultural experiment stations in 1879, and the passage of the act is largely to the credit of the grange.

Has always opposed any tariff on commercial fertilizers.

Has supported all laws favoring the extension of co-operation.

In 1885 the National Grange declared in favor of primary election laws.

Favored the enactment in 1887 of a law prohibiting the manufacture and sale of colored oleomargarine.

The grange was a pioneer in demanding the direct election of United States senators.

As early as 1882 the grange favored the establishment of a parcel post. This is one of the notable achievements of the grange.

The farm loan system was endorsed in 1889 and the battle won by the grange in 1916.

Was an early advocate of rural mail delivery, and after 30 years' effort this became an accomplished fact.

The grange has opposed the enactment of a sales tax, and for many years advocated an equitable graduated inheritance tax.

The grange has always supported every form of agricultural extension by the agricultural colleges and experiment stations and vigorously supported the Smith-Lever act providing national appropriations for county agent and extension expenses.

J. A. Nee of North Powder, master of Union County Pomona Grange, will have a dedication of his new home on November 29.

Many grangers throughout the county are planning to attend and are looking forward to a most enjoyable time, as this will be the first grange home dedication in Union county.

Oregon has organized more subordinate granges this year than any state in the Union with the exception of North Carolina, the latter state having had the help of the National Grange organizers, according to a report from the national secretary. Oregon has 30 new granges, with Washington a close second with 27. Thirteen new juvenile granges were added and two pomona have been established in Oregon during the year of 1929. Four subordinate granges were reorganized.

## U. P. Will Take Lead In Active Western Program

Tuesday's White House conference at which President Herbert Hoover urged leading railroad executives to organize in a progressive building program in the east, developed the fact that an active development program is already under way throughout the western states with the Union Pacific System taking a leading part with an expenditure of more than \$16,000,000.

Modernizing and remodeling the union passenger station at Portland at a cost of \$250,000, and rebuilding boxcars at Portland involving an expenditure of \$2,400,000 are listed among the items which go to make up the \$16,000,000 building and expansion fund. Another item was the increase of the capitalization of a Union Pacific motor stables subsidiary, the Interstate Transh Line from \$1,000,000 to \$2,000,000 to take care of new equipment and facilities.

This \$16,000,000 fund is not the 1930 budget of the Union Pacific. The railroad's 1930 improvement and maintenance budget will be announced next February. Omaha, Nebraska, gets a new

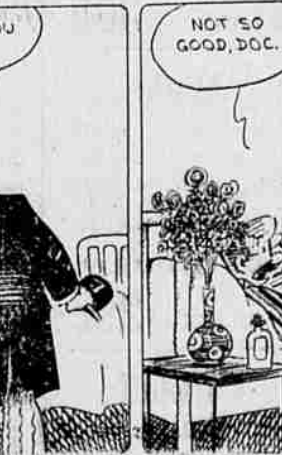
