Oregon License Tax On Insurance Agents Sustained

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25 (AP)—The Oregon license tax on insurance agents was sustained by the supreme court today in a case appealed by Karl Hebring, who challenged its validity.

Hebring wanted to be agent at Portland for the Northwestern National Fire Insurance company. Companies are permitted one agent in smaller towns and two in cities of 50,000 population or more upon payment of a two dollar fee for each agent. In larger cities, however, \$500 is required for a license for each agent in addition to the first two.

The law was attacked as discriminatory. Gift taxes imposed under the federal revenue law were held valid today by the supreme court in a case brought by Joseph H. Bromley of Philadelphia who was required to pay a tax of \$20,598 on gifts totaling \$568,300.

times he sat through an all-night filibuster, while younger members sought the comfort of their beds. He scorned the elevators at the capitol, always using the stairs in going back and forth between the senate chambers and his office.

With the advent of the Harding administration in 1921, Senator Warren became chairman of the important appropriations committee on which post he served until his death. In this capacity he had the responsibility of guiding through the senate legislation providing billions of dollars for the conduct of the federal government.

His death left some uncertainty in its wake as to who his successor will be. Senator Snout of Utah, the ranking republican, is chairman of the finance committee, a post he is not expected to relinquish for the appropriations chairmanship, and Senator Jones of Washington, next in line, is chairman of the commerce committee and his views on the relative desirability of the two committee chairmanships are unknown.

President Hoover led official Washington in paying tribute to the deceased legislator. SENY, MATEZ of his life the chief executive said, was "marked by increasing industry and by devotion to national welfare."

per. 1-2 cup melted butter, 1 egg (optional), hot water or milk. Crumb bread, discarded crust, Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Add melted butter, slowly tossing with a fork to mix it through the crumbs. Add egg well beaten and mix lightly with work. Add not more than one-half cup boiling water and mix with fork. Make the dressing about as moist as wanted for serving. Mix well with fork to insure thorough blending.

For celery stuffing, add one bunch of celery chopped fine. For oyster stuffing, add one quart oysters, using oyster juice for liquid and one tablespoon parsley.

For mushroom stuffing, add one cup chopped and sauted mushrooms, using butter for stuffing. For sausage stuffing, add one-half pound sausage meat removed from casing and bake to a crisp brown.

For chestnut stuffing, reduce bread crumbs to one-half the amount and add one quart of shell, blanched and boiled chestnuts. The nuts can be mashed or finely chopped.

An unusual and delicious stuffing is made by combining chestnuts and crushed pineapple with bread crumbs. Use equal amounts of finely chopped, boiled chestnuts and crushed pineapple and half as much bread crumbs which have been tossed in melted butter. Season lightly with salt and pepper and use pineapple juice to moisten. Let stand a few minutes after combining all the ingredients except the juice to be sure the stuffing needs more moisture.

There are several different types of plum puddings—rich, eggless, bread or cracker crumb, and graham or entire wheat flour. The ages and tastes of her guests will enable the hostess to choose the pudding best suited to her needs. A rich plum pudding served with a rich sauce is not suitable for children, but the simple graham pudding can be given to them without danger of over-taxing small digestions.

Graham Plum Pudding Three tablespoons butter, 1-2 cup molasses, 1-2 cup milk, 1 egg, 1 cup graham flour, 1-2 cup white flour, 1-2 teaspoon soda, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 1-4 teaspoon cloves, 1-2 teaspoon nutmeg, 1-2 pound stone.
