Health Talks

MALIGNANT DISEASE OF BONE INCREASINGLY CURABLE

We observe no cures after an amputation for a malignant disease of bone in the Johns Hopkins clinic until 1923, a period of twenty-four years after the clinic began. The percentage of cures by 1923 was less than five. But by 1927 it was more than twenty-five. What explains this change? The education of the people to the necessity of an immediate X-ray examination when there is any injury to a bone, whether there be a fracture or not.

The malignant disease of bone is called sarcoma—a word meaning fleshy tumor, while carcinoma is a malignant tumor arising in the skin or the mucous membrane or the glands which are derived from the skin and the mucous membrane. Sarcoma is the malignant tumor that arises in bone and muscle and any of the different types of so-called connective tissue. While chronic irritation seems to be the chief demonstrable cause of carcinoma, a single injury apparently may at least be one of the causes of sarcoma. Fortunately, in the vast majority of cases of injury sarcoma never appears.

Relatively, sarcoma is a rare disease as compared with cancer. But whenever there is pain in a bone, or any limp or loss of function, the first thing to do is to get an X-ray. It is impossible to have any marked disease of bone without its showing in the X-ray. Fortunately, the diseases of bone that are not cancer and have no relation to sarcoma are more frequent than sarcoma.

We do not know what precedes sarcoma of bone. Undoubtedly there is a local lesion, which is not sarcoma of bone. Undoubtedly development of the malignant tumor, but it has not been demonstrated, and no one has been given an opportunity to cure a sarcoma by recognizing and removing the local lesion that precedes it.

Fortunately, however, if an X-ray is taken the moment there is a warning, the chances of a cure of sarcoma are relatively good.

Birth Control Is Fostered In Japan

TOKYO (AP)—The capital of Japan is making official preparations to furnish birth control information to its poor in an effort to relieve the suffering that comes from large families in poverty-stricken homes.

This sociological experiment, especially startling in the Orient where ancestor worship has placed a premium on large families, is being fostered by birth control information to its poor in an effort to relieve the suffering that comes from large families in poverty-stricken homes.

Yukioji Shirokawa, deputy mayor of Tokyo, said it was the purpose to give information only to couples that already have four children and can show that they are too poor to care for more. Information will be devoted to young newly married couples and to persons of wealth.

Mr. Shirokawa said that the municipality hoped birth control would help to lower the high infant mortality rate and eventually reduce the number of families dependent on official charity.

Gophers Bested By Government In Arizona Area

PHOENIX, Arizona (AP)—A queer little rat-like animal cost the farmers of Arizona thousands of dollars annually until the United States biological survey stepped in.

Now the survey workers, of which there are a dozen or more with headquarters at Phoenix, have built up a trophy pile of nearly 100,000 enemies' tails, evidence of animals trapped in the campaign. Perhaps twice that number have been poisoned.

The animal is commonly known as a pocket gopher because of his joy pokes. In these, he pokes the dirt he digs and carries it to the surface to get it out of his way. He lives underground and comes to the surface only to throw up mounds of dirt removed from his subterranean runways.

Although harmless to humans, the pocket gopher is highly destructive of growing things. His great concave front teeth cut through the largest of roots or trees, if the wood pulp suits his taste. He is fond of cutting off the roots of rose bushes, ornamental shrubs, palm trees and damaging fruit bearing crops.

Frequently he burms his subterranean streets and highways under man's automobile roads, and eventually a cave-in occurs, leaving a dangerous "chuck" hole in which to break over wheels and springs.

Hiding the farms of these pests has proved a problem not alone in Arizona but in other western states as well. The biological survey, however, has had marked success both with poison and with spring traps and it gradually is getting the upper hand.

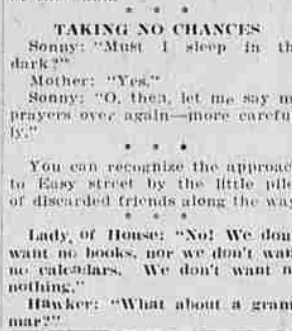
