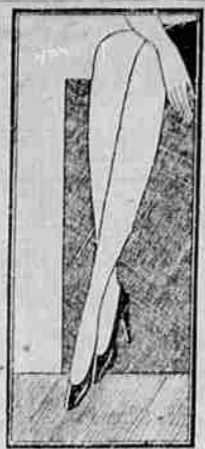

Defeat for Either Eleven Will Eliminate it From Coast Leadership.

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 26 (AP)—A defense against the hard hitting attack of the Washington State Cougars, with Elmer Swartz as the leader in these ground gaining tactics, is the problem which faced Coach Howard Jones' University of Southern California football team today.

The Trojan grid master has a hard, bloody scrimmage, outlined for this afternoon determined to place the second conference defeat in the record of the invaders as a parting shot at the Pacific coast standings this season.

Defeat for either eleven will eliminate it from the present five-contender tie for top honors, and a victory will give the U. S. C. a superior percentage over the other contenders by virtue of more conference games.

GAINS NEARLY A MILE. TUSCALOOSA, Ala., Nov. 26 (AP)—Tony Holm, Alabama full-back, has gained nearly a mile against Alabama's toes this year. Latest records credit him with 1,293 yards this season. Only McEvey, of Tennessee, has out-gained the Crimson Tide's full-back in any one game this year. McEvey gained seven more yards than Holm but was in the Tennessee-Alabama game four minutes longer and carried the ball often.

APPOINT PROSECUTORS. SALEM, Ore., Nov. 25 (AP)—At the suggestion of Judge George P. Skipworth of Eugene, presiding referee of the board of referees that will hear the disbarment case involving George Joseph and Thomas Mannix of Portland, the two accused attorneys will be prosecuted by different groups of attorneys representing the state. This will meet the protest filed by Joseph against the supreme court's appointment of W. Laur Thompson of Portland as one of the prosecutors to serve against Mannix. Chief Justice Coshaw said today that Arthur Clark of Corvallis, Evan A. Reames of Medford and Arthur K. McMahon of Albany had been appointed prosecutors in the Mannix case.

LUMBER MAN DIES. PORTLAND, Nov. 25 (AP)—After having been closely identified with the lumber industry of the Pacific Northwest for 25 years, O. M. Clark, 78, founder of the Clark & Wilson Lumber company, died at a hospital here yesterday. He had been ill only a short time. Funeral services will be held Wednesday. The Rev. O. W. Taylor, rector of Grace Memorial Episcopal church here will conduct the services.

DIES AFTER BAD DRIVE. TULSA, Okla., Nov. 25 (AP)—Nathan Greenberg, Tulsa business man, dropped dead on the first tee of the McFarlin country club here yesterday after a bad drive. Death was attributed to "a heart attack by strong emotion."

D., Nov. 26 (AP)—The University of North Dakota football team, North Central conference champion for the past two seasons, is being considered as the Christmas day opponent of the St. Mary's (California) team. Coach Jack West, of the Nomads, has been asked for terms, and is willing to accept. The game for the American Legion's benefit fund for crippled children, would be played at Los Angeles.

Fire Loss High In This State During October

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 26 (Special)—Of the total of 100 fires reported for Oregon outside of Portland, representing estimated losses aggregating \$337,505 during the month of October, 56 fires involved rural properties and products entailing losses of \$123,103; 17 were industrial losses, amounting to \$112,479; there were 26 city dwelling and contents fires, causing losses of \$23,925, and four fires were in mercantile establishments with losses of \$23,820, according to the monthly estimate of state losses given out by State Fire Marshal Clarence A. Lee.

Of the farm property losses 25 fires destroyed dwellings and contents valued at \$59,625, an average of \$2,385 per fire as compared to 26 city dwelling fires with a total of \$33,925 in losses or an average of \$1,270 per fire. There were 11 fires which damaged farm barns, outbuildings and contents to the value of \$11,795 and 3 fruit driers and contents was burned amounting to \$23,780 in total losses or \$4,367 per fire. One rural warehouse and contents was burned with an estimated loss of \$5,000 in Deschutes county. Of the heaviest prune drier losses, three fires in Polk county damaged property estimated at \$27,600; two in Marion county, \$5,470 and two in Douglas county \$4,000.

Of the \$112,479 losses suffered by industrial plants during October, seven were in sawmills and the lumbering industry, \$84,250

damages; two in warehouses and contents, \$5,095; one blacksmith shop, \$4,000; one laundry, \$400, and six in garages and contents, \$13,725. Of the garage fires, one was at Beavercreek, loss \$10,900; one at Salem, \$3,500; and one at Baker, \$1,500. One hotel fire in Umatilla county caused damages of \$30,000 and one at Rufus, \$5,000.

The October 1929 losses were the greatest of any year since 1924 with the exception of October, 1925 when the estimated monthly loss was \$967,673; were \$53,458 greater than October last year and \$10,000 greater than the average October for the five years previous, but were \$57,220 less than those for the month of September this year. The state losses, outside of Portland for the 10 months period of 1929 amounted to \$5,292,933, which were \$412,905 less than the average corresponding period for the previous five years.

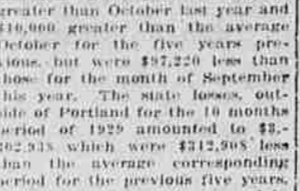
Of the 49 fires of known origin 18 were caused by overheard or defective stoves, ranges, furnaces, or fires inflicting damage of \$27,620; six were caused by electricity or defective wiring, damage, \$7,650 and nine were due to conflagration or exposure causing total losses of \$12,820, of which seven were slashing fires which got beyond control and destroyed \$3,700 in habitation values. Fifty-three of the total number of fires reported had not been determined as to origin when the report was compiled representing \$220,240 or 65 per cent of the total losses.
