Seed Oats Sent To Snake River By Parcel Post

LOSTINE, Ore. (Special)—A ton of seed oats was shipped by parcel post from the wool growers warehouse in Enterprise to James Duran on Snake river. The distance between Enterprise and the Duran ranch is about 50 miles but the oats in the mail traveled 300 miles to get to its destination, going to La Grande, Pendleton, Umatilla, Wallula and Lewiston and on to the Snake river where it was taken by boat.

While working at the line quarry of the Black Marble company south of Enterprise, E. E. Harton was painfully cut about the head in a rock blast. He did not get far enough away from the blast and was thrown in the air, coming down on his head. He was taken to town where his injury was dressed.

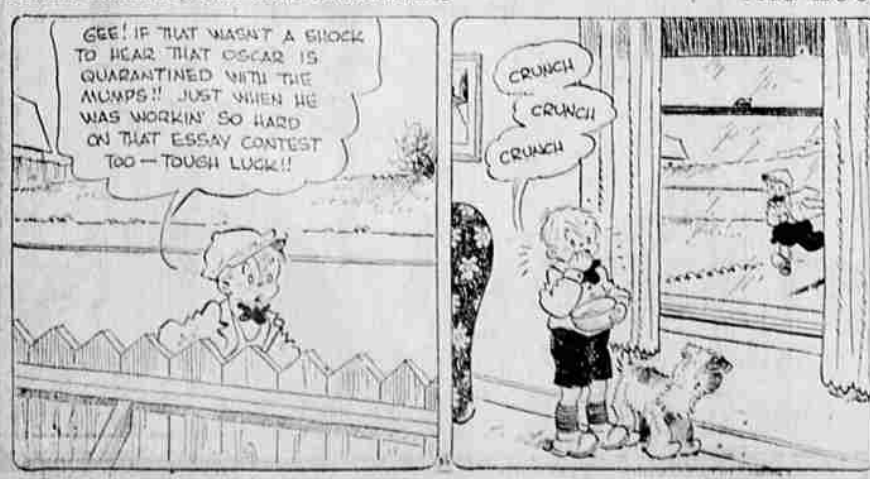
