## ARMY LAST HOPE TO STOP ROCKNE

Coach Biff Jones to Send Soldiers Against Notre Dame in New York.

WEST POINT, N. Y., Nov. 27.—(AP)—Except for two positions, Coach Biff Jones of the Army knows what lineup he will start against Notre Dame at the Yankee stadium, New York, on Saturday, and the chances are that he knows the answers to those two problems as well. If he does, though, he isn't telling anyone.

Center and quarterback are the two positions open to question. Miller and Lazar are vying for the snap-back job and Cawyer, Bowman and Gilmer all are in the field for quarterback. The rest of the starting lineup probably will include Cagle, Murrell and Gatty in the backfield, and Perry, Price, Hillinger, Ham-

ber, Messinger and Cardmark on the line.

It's reported that Jones will start his second team, as he did against Dickinson, Ohio Wesleyan and several other foes, because he is bound on anything but fact. Jones is expected to start his strongest combination.

The squad will not go to New York until Friday, taking a light workout at Travers Island. The boys will wait until Saturday to travel to the Yankee stadium. "We know the stadium very well," says Jones.

### Whitman and Willamette In Title Contest

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 27 (AP)—Coach Spec Keene of Willamette university will leave here this evening at the head of two full teams of football players for Walla Walla where on Thursday they will meet Whitman in a game that will decide the championship of the Northwest conference. While the Willamette forwards are reported in excellent shape, an epidemic of injuries among the backfield men has cut into the performance of that section to a considerable extent. Coach Keene would make no forecast as to the probable outcome of the game, but predicted a hard fought struggle. A special train of routers will accompany the squad.

#### ANDERSON WINS MATCH

## Eastern Oregon Grid Season To End Thursday

Eastern Oregon high school football will come to a definite end tomorrow, with two important games scheduled—Mac-Hi at Ontario and Enterprise at Pendleton.

Incidentally, a Mac-Hi team was beaten by the Hepperton eleven last Saturday, 32 to 9, but this has no bearing on the championship race. Six of the Miltont-Preswater players were barred from the game because of the weight advantage over the west-end team, and for that reason, the game does not affect the Pioneers standing in the championship race, any more than it would if the game had been advertised beforehand as being a second-hand skirmish.

So, as a matter of fact, the Mac-Hi first team only needs one more win to go through three seasons undefeated by Eastern Oregon eleven, and Ontario and Thanksgiving day are the combination that they hope to make bring this about.

The Pendleton-Enterprise game is expected to be a "hummer," with the toss-up more or less in doubt, although Pendleton is conceded to have a slight advantage. Enterprise lost to La Grande 20 to 13 and Pendleton lost 7 to 6, so there is little to select between the two.

Pendleton pins most of her faith on a strong line and a flashy backfield, led by McInnis, while Enterprise also has a strong defense, and a dazzling aerial attack.

**Sport Slants**

The life of an Army football coach; that is, his coaching life, is comparatively short, measured by the yardstick of such veterans in the service as Rockne, Warner, Zuppke, Stagg and Bobbie. But it is nearly so troublesome, whatever handicaps it may hold.

They have no alumni to worry about, nor grandfathers of strategy. Since the regulations at West Point limit the term of any head coach to four years, he can concentrate on the job without the bogaboos of bothering about what will happen when a contract runs out.

"On the other hand, the Army coach has to work with material subject to the strictest kind of discipline, where there is no chance for the player to sidestep his main duties, and under the handicap of competing with college coaches who can make the game their business over a long period of time," points out Capt. L. M. (Biff) Jones, who ends his four-year term at West Point this year.

Under Biff Jones, Army football has risen to its greatest heights and featured two of its most spectacular stars, "Light Horse" Harry Wilson, captain of the 1927 team that beat the Navy in the last service game, and Christian Kneuer-Cagle, All-American leader of the last Jones-cemented eleven. The last four years have seen West Point attract greater crowds, play more spectacular football and draw more nationwide interest than in any other period.

In three big games so far against Harvard, Yale and Illinois, West Point has played before over 20,000 spectators and nearly 30,000 more will witness the game with Notre Dame at the Yankee Stadium Nov. 30 and around 70,000 will fill the big stadium at Palo Alto for the closing clash with Stanford Dec. 23.

Jones, an artillerist, rounds out eleven years of coaching altogether, although serving only the last four as head coach. He came

The attitude of the Army, so far as the relations with the Navy are concerned, is that they can afford to wait for their own terms of conciliation to be met. Notre Dame furnished a dismal rivalry this year that yields nothing in general interest to an Army-Navy battle. And as for the rest of its season, West Point is well occupied in taking on Harvard, Yale or such international rivals as Illinois and Stanford.

West Point's policy of taking on representative teams from all parts of the country, since the break with Navy, has done more than anything else to keep the Cadets in the spotlight. Major "Phil" Fleming, in the role of "graduate manager," has conducted these successful maneuvers to increase Army prestige in the athletic world, helped no little by the personal exploits on the field of the well known Mr. Cagle. It was a break for West Point that at a time when it decided to "step out" and take on the toughest of the lot the team happened to have one of the greatest open field ball-carriers of
