Englishman To Wed Negro of South Africa

LONDON, Nov. 27 (AP)—Oscar Slater, who spent nearly twenty years of his life under sentence and conviction for murder, only finally to be exonerated and awarded \$50,000 for wrongful imprisonment, was said by the Daily Mail today to be contemplating marriage with a full-blooded South African Kaffir woman.

Slater was accused of the murder in 1908 of Miss Mary Gilchrist, an aged woman, although he was not arrested until the following year, when Glasgow agents met him as he stepped from the Lusitania at New York. He was extradited, tried, convicted and sentenced to death, his sentence later being commuted to life imprisonment.
