Washed Oil Waste Good to Use Again

CHESTERTOWN, Md. (AP)—Soap and water wash the waste lubricating oil of automobiles in a new oil reclaiming process devised by Dr. Carl D. Miller, professor of physics at Washington college here.

Use of water and some ordinary commercial washing powders to separate solid matter from the oil is one of the first steps of the reclaiming.

The second of this washing is to keep the oil from emulsifying—that is, turning into a milky substance. Then action of the soap and water, Dr. Miller claims to have prevented this emulsification.

In a five-month test on crankcase drainings of the Baltimore & Annapolis company, Adriaan Hughes, a chemist here, says that from 825 gallons of drainings 416 gallons of satisfactory lubricant have been recovered and used over again in the motor.

In addition there were recovered 175 gallons of kerosene. Allowing a credit for the kerosene, the cost of the reclaimed oil was 10 cents a gallon.

Radio Fans Send Different Letters

Fan letters, radio's cross section of public opinion, have undergone a radical change in the few years that broadcasting has existed.

Once listeners wrote something like this: "I got your station on my one-tube. It was coming in fine."

Without the statement, "coming in fine," no letter seemed complete. That, by the way, was the era of the mere thrill of listening.

Nowadays most of the letters refer exclusively to the type of program being presented. Either they request a certain number or ask for something offered by certain sponsors.

However, some still write eulogies and some pen complaints. WRAL, Baltimore, has been making a survey of its letters, and it makes this observation:

"One notes now far more dignity in the letters and much more balance than formerly. Judging from the fan mail, radio's emotional age has passed and in its place is calm, studied listening."

Amateurs Will Try Voice 'Round World'

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP)—Radio amateurs, who won acclaim a few years ago by discovering the value of short waves, are to try their talents in a new field.

The federal radio commission has authorized the frequency band from 14.1 to 14.35 megacycles for amateur experimentation. In voice on these channels during the daylight hours it is possible to hold radiophone conversations with all parts of the world.

Owing to the danger of interference with radio telegraph communication on wave lengths near these channels, the commission has decided to restrict their use to a select group of expert amateurs. They will include about 50 who hold "voice first class amateur operator" licenses and others who can show "special technical qualifications and ability."

One purpose of the experiment is to ascertain if the channels are suitable for future use by commercial communication enterprises.

The danger of interference is said to be much greater from voice transmission than from code and consequently the transmitting sets used will have to be equipped with the most modern frequency control apparatus.

In the past the amateurs have been restricted to three bands for radio telephony communications. None of these is suited for international communication.

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COURT AGAIN DENIES RADIO 'VESTED RIGHT'

WASHINGTON (AP)—A high court again has denied the contention of broadcasting stations that they can acquire property rights in the use of wavelength. In full time operation of the use of certain transmission power.

This ruling is regarded by radio men and lawyers here as the most important part of the decision made by the court of appeals of the District of Columbia upholding the authority of the federal radio commission to order WNYC, New York, to divide time with WJMA of the same city.


WNYC, in its appeal, contended that it had obtained a property right to operate from 11:00 till midnight and that the commission's order amounted to a taking of property without due process of law in violation of the United States constitution.

"We do not agree with this contention," the court said. "In our opinion the interstate broadcasting of radio communications is a species of interstate commerce and as such is subject of federal regulation."
