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New Study Club Has Its First Hike to Wallowa

The Paleolithicans, newly-organized archaeological and geological club of Imbler high school, took their first trip last Saturday, when nine students, accompanied by H. G. Johnson, club faculty adviser, and Milo Pratt, Imbler scoutmaster, made the trip to Wallowa lake to study some of the aspects of a gloriated country. Aside from the educational aspect, members of the party declared that the scenic beauties of the region, and especially the ice-locked falls and river were not to be passed by without remark.

Included in the party were Theron Anderson, George Riggs, Chadwick Pratt, Gerald Masters, Doshia Graybeal, Florence Beem, Dorman Jackson, Winona Westenskow, Opal Skilling and the club advisers. The group left Imbler at sun up in the morning, in two of the modern versions of the flivver automobile, and stopped at points along the route of geologic interest. About four hours were spent in the immediate vicinity of the lake, during which the party studied frost-carved summits, glaciated summits, moraines, various kinds of rocks, and George Riggs finally relieved the party of nervous strain by ducking himself in the Wallowa river as a finale to a series of outbursts of his exuberant spirit. The club plans a series of trips, to be taken as weather permits.

A SEASONABLE RECIPE

Oatmeal Bars. One cup sugar. One-half cup fat. Two eggs. Two-thirds cup milk or more. Two cups quick oatmeal. Two cups flour. One cup raisins. One teaspoon cinnamon. One teaspoon soda. The batter should be a little thinner than drop cookie batter. Nuts may be added to make the cakes more tasty. Sometimes I vary the recipe by adding one cup stoned and cut up dates, one half cup nuts, omitting the cinnamon, using one teaspoon vanilla and icing with any white icing. These are called oatmeal bars and are baked in a large dripping pan about twenty or thirty minutes in slow oven.

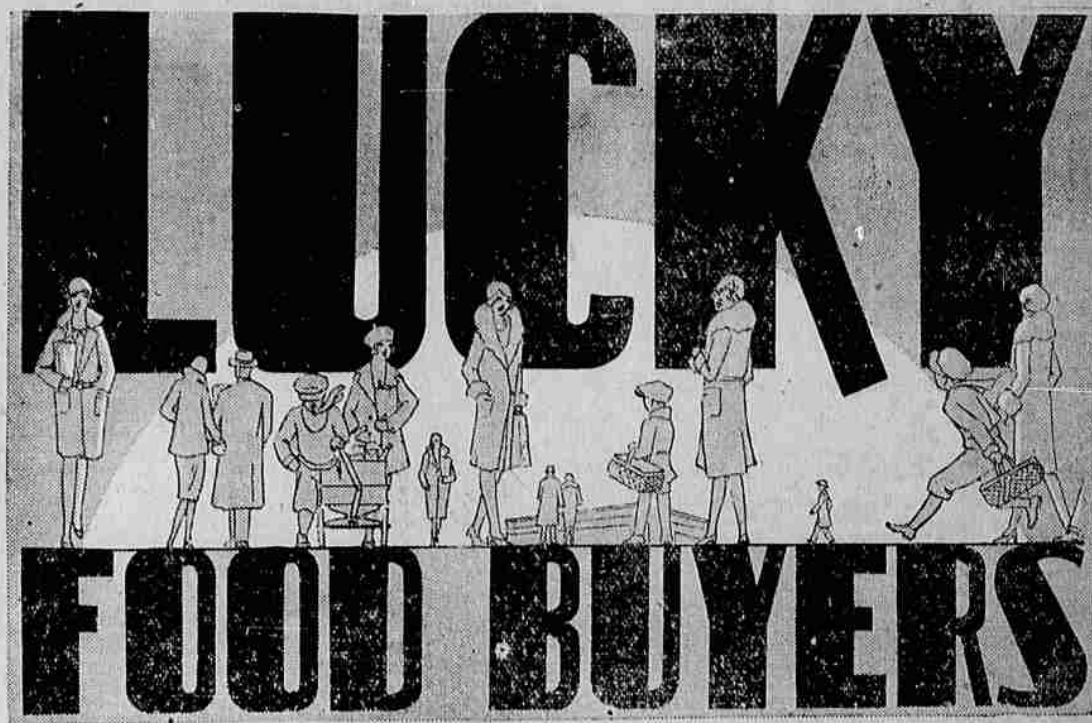
MANY PLANTINGS MADE OF BOTH SWEET AND SOUR CHERRIES

At this, the season for new planting or re-planting of fruit trees, reports are that all over the valley much is being done in the way of re-planting the supply of cherry orchards, principally in the Grande Ronde valley. Many acres of sweet cherries are being set out, about 40 trees being allowed to the acre and present orchardists are replacing old trees which have died. There is another phase to the cherry business in this valley, also, al-

though this does not affect the sour cherries for which the valley is famous. The contents being circulated for sour cherries for the new cannery have met with some success and several hundred acres have already been contracted for. It is pointed out that the sour cherries will flourish on soil which is not at all suitable for sweet cherries and land owners having such soil on their farms have been advised by fruit men to set out the sour cherries. The Montmorency is the variety of sour cherry which is being most largely set out in this region.

According to reports at hand the following are some of the Union county fruit men who are either putting in new orchards, or re-setting old cherry orchards:

- Frank Mueck of near Cove is putting out 80 trees, making nearly two acres of new orchard. Archie McNeill of Mill Creek canyon is putting in two acres, new. Chris Bertsch, of Mill Creek canyon is putting in two new acres and also doing some re-planting. Merle Russell of near Cove is putting in two acres, new. George Galley is putting out 50 trees, about an acre and a quarter, new. Tom Conklin is putting in 300 Montmorency trees on soil where he has previously tried sweet cherries and prunes, with no success. Heans of Elgin is putting out 50 Montmorency trees and 50 sweet cherries. A. E. Hug of La Grande is putting out 250 of the sour cherries on his farm on Pumpkin Ridge. Joe Goyette of Cove is putting in a new orchard, consisting of 150 trees, some of them being the sweet cherries.
